

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New England Recipes Shared by Mrs. Nelson

Recipes, tried and approved during America's early days, are the contributions today given by Mrs. Godfrey Nelson, who came to Torrance from New England in 1957. Mrs. Nelson, who has become prominently identified with the civic and cultural life of Torrance during her short residence, was born in Cheshire, Mass., the third generation in her family born in this town made famous by its gift of a big cheese made there and sent by ox cart to President Jefferson in the White House.

After her marriage, Mrs. Nelson lived in Southwick where she and her husband still own their home, going back to spend part of their summers there.

They are the parents of a daughter, Mrs. Anthony Naiden of Southwick. They have two grandsons, Jonathan and Peter. Mr. Nelson has been employed for the past four years by the Harvey Aluminum Co. here. The couple will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary July 26.

In Southwick, Mrs. Nelson was president of the Woman's

club, active in DAR and was head librarian at the Southwick library. She was also active in garden and dramatic groups. In Torrance, she is a member of the Torrance Woman's club, of which she is chairman of the drama section, member of the Gardena Fuchsia society and associate member of the El Redondo chapter of DAR. She and Mr. Nelson are members of the Tournament of Roses Assn. and have assisted with the Torrance float for the past three years.

The recipes she is sharing today have been handed down in her family for several generations. Many of them call for one cup plus or one cup minus, showing that many of New England's early cooks experimented with their recipes until they were just right.

Lemon Pie
7 tbs. cornstarch 3 egg yolks
1 1/2 sugar 1/2 c. lemon juice
1/4 tsp. salt (fresh)
1 1/2 c. hot water 2 tbs. butter

Mix cornstarch, sugar and salt, thoroughly in sauce pan. Pour in hot water and cook over high heat, stirring constantly until thick and translucent. Remove from stove, add beaten egg yolks and return to stove and cook over low heat, stirring constantly for 6 min. Remove from heat and add lemon juice and butter. Cool filling before pouring into baked pie shell, then top with meringue.

MEERINGUE
3 egg whites
1/4 tsp. Cream of Tartar
6 tbs. sugar

Beat whites and cream of tartar until foamy and white. Gradually add sugar and beat until stiff but not dry. Spread over filling, attaching meringue to edges of crust. Make swirls on top with spoon. Bake at 400 degrees until golden brown. Cool several hours away from drafts before cutting.

Filled Sponge Cake
1 c. plus 3 tbs. flour 3 eggs
(cake or pastry) 1 c. sugar
1 tsp. Baking Powder 1 c. hot water
1/4 tsp. salt 2 tsp. lemon extract

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Beat egg yolks until creamy, add half the sugar slowly and continue beating. Add hot water and remaining sugar and beat for 5 minutes. Fold in carefully the sifted flour mixture and flavoring. Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold into mixture. Bake 45 to 55 minutes in slow oven at 350 degrees.

Dream Squares
Mix together 1 1/4 c. flour and 2 tbs. brown sugar. Blend in 1/2 c. butter thoroughly. Press mixture into an oblong pan. Beat 2 eggs, add 1 1/2 c. 1/4 brown sugar, 1 c. shredded coconut, 1/2 cup chopped walnut meats and 1 tsp. vanilla. Spread over the "crust" and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) for approximately 35 minutes or until brown. Cut in squares.
