

Leon Carpenter Jr. Wins Eagle Scout Badge King to Ask Congressional Missile Transfer Look

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The December Court of Honor was an important night for Leon Carpenter Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Carpenter of 1346 W. 221st St., when he was presented the Eagle Award by Paul Thies of the Los Angeles Council.

The Eagle Badge is the highest award that can be earned by a Scout. Leon has been active in Scouting for the past seven years, three years in Pack 222 and four years in Troop 315 and 315X, the latter sponsored by the Torrance Moose Lodge.

Leon served his Troop as a patrol leader and librarian, and the past year he has been treasurer of Explorer Post 315X under the leadership of J. L. Waters. Leon was nominated to the Order of the Arrow, a select group of Scout- ing.

LEON CARPENTER JR. Wins Eagle Award

"The Air Force is wasting millions of dollars in needless spending of funds Congress appropriated for development of our ballistic missile programs," Congressman Cecil R. King charged yesterday.

He said he had conferred with members of his National Defense Facilities Subcommittee on information uncovered in investigating Air Force plans to break-up and move part of the Inglewood Missile Complex to Norton Air Force Base.

"BECAUSE OF the nature and importance of our findings, it was agreed that Congress be asked to conduct a full scale investigation into the misuse of ballistic missile funds by high-ranking Air Force personnel," Congressman King declared.

Commenting as the ranking member of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, King added:

"THIS MATTER poses a serious threat to our national economy, particularly since some military leaders have already suggested that higher taxes may be required to foot the bills of our future defense programs."

King said that his committee report "giving facts and figures to show the proposed Air Force break-up of the Inglewood Complex will cost taxpayers \$10 million dollars, and delay missile programs" is also being submitted to newly appointed Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara and Secretary of the Air Force Eugene Zuckert.

IN A STATEMENT, Congressman King said:

"Congress has appropriated billions of dollars for our ballistic missiles program and the Air Force has been assigned the responsibility of managing and directing it."

"The Air Force also has the responsibility of not wasting missile funds in needless spending."

"EVERY CENT of the tax money appropriated should be spent to research, develop, and produce ballistic missiles as quickly as possible."

"The survival of our free way of life may depend on the success of this program."

"Our investigation has uncovered a shocking number of instances where the Air Force management of the Inglewood Complex has mis-spent missile funds, and even laid plans to needlessly spend more."

"AS EXAMPLES, I cite briefly but a few of the many items which show Air Force mis-management of missile funds:

1) The Air Force owns only three of the 13 buildings it now occupies in the Inglewood area. Ten of the buildings are occupied under expensive leasing arrangements—involving millions of dollars—with payments greatly exceeding the cost of the property. The Air Force refused to purchase several at cost and as a result the Government will never obtain title under the negotiated leases.

2) SEVERAL million dollars worth of office equipment for the Inglewood Complex was rented by the Air Force from a contractor on a five-year lease. If these items had been purchased through General Service Administration, the Government central purchasing agency, the Air Force would have saved \$460,000, exclusive of contractor's fees.

3) Many thousands of dollars in missile funds were wasted because the Air Force failed to exercise options to purchase needed equipment at fractional cost prices after expiration of leases. In many cases, the Air Force suggested that the contractor negotiate for the purchase of such equipment. The contractor would buy equipment for the same fractional price offered to the Air Force. The government would then be charged these costs by the contractor in overhead expenses. As a result, the Air Force paid more for equipment than it originally cost, and the contractor became the owner.

4) LAST AUGUST Air Force officials of the Inglewood Complex turned down \$10,000 worth of new office furniture offered by GSA — without charge to the missile program — for use in the Torrance Annex building, because "it did not meet the decor." Subsequently, \$13,000 of missile funds were spent to purchase an equivalent amount of furniture.

5) The Air Force presently has plans to spend \$3 million dollars to rehabilitate old warehouse buildings at Norton Air Force Base for office space to accommodate the 1000 people planned for transfer in the break-up move of the Inglewood Complex. Local contractors report that a new modern building can be constructed in the Inglewood vicinity to accommodate more than 1000 people for less than one-quarter of what the proposed move will cost the missile program.

"If the pattern of waste found at the Inglewood Complex should project to other Air Force installations throughout the world, the magnitude of the total loss of our Nation's tax money would be staggering."

Supervisor Burton W. Chace announced today that street lights have been proposed for New Hampshire Ave., Doble Ave., Jeffrey Ave., Payne Ave., and 214th St. in the area between 208th St. and 214th St. in the Carson area.

Pointing out that residential street lighting must be paid for by residents themselves, Chace noted that the signatures of the owners of at least 60 per cent of the taxable property within the area are required before the proposal can be presented to the Board of Supervisors for further action.

A petition has been prepared at the request of Mrs. Harold Malin, 21287 S. Doble Ave., and those interested in street lighting should contact her, Chace said.
