

# Strong Support Reported For County Bond Proposals

"Never in my many years of activity in behalf of worthy public causes have I witnessed such unanimity of support from community organizations and prominent individuals as that which has developed for County Bond Propositions A and B on the June 7 primary ballot to finance construction at the General Hospital and

the building of a separate women's jail," Martin Pollard, general campaign chairman of the Citizens Committee for "Yes" on A and B said yesterday.

"Beginning with a luncheon meeting of the Citizens Committee of 400, representing every section of the county and every aspect of our communi-

ty life, when the five supervisors and the sheriff pledged their all-out support, the campaign has seen a steady flow of endorsements for the two bond proposals," Pollard said. "So far as we know there is no organized opposition."

"PROPOSITION B would provide \$6,315,000 to build a separate women's jail, which we have never had. This minimum program of construction would relieve conditions that are now intolerable among the sick and among women detained by legal process.

"The bond method of financ-

ing would spread the load over 20 years at low interest rates, put part of the burden on the future population and hold the tax rate at the lowest possible minimum, less than one cent per \$100 of assessed valuation. The alternative would be to use general funds, which would entail a sharp increase in the tax rate, perhaps as much as 18 cents if the projects were to be financed in a single year.

"All the organizations and individuals mentioned and a great many more join the supervisors, the sheriff and the citizens committee of 400 in urging a large turnout of "Yes" votes on County Bond Propositions A and B," Pollard concluded.
