 Unseasonably hot weather is reported to have caused about 25 per cent loss to apples in the Sebastopol area, famous for Gravensteins. Oak Glen reports some severe damage showing up in spots from a late frost. Other fruits are hastening to maturity from the warm weather . . . apricots, cherries (a few showing sunburn). A good crop of cherries from Beaumont-Cherry Valley. You may pick your own if you prefer. A festival in that district from June 16-19 will bring crowds on Saturday and Sunday. Week-

days will be much less crowded.  
 Grapes from the desert vineyards . . . Pearlette harvest about completed in Borrego Valley, Thompson Seedless Perlettes, Beauty Seedless, Cardinals and a few Muscats from other desert district.  
 Nectarine picking began in the San Joaquin Valley, and more and more peaches . . . and more and more varieties . . . everyday.  
 Plums are making fine progress. Beauty and Burmosa (early crops) show a little sunburn from the heat, but late crops show no damage and no loss is expected.  
 Desert grapefruit still rolling to market. Mature, sweet.
