### Builders Ring Up Eighth Win In Row, 2-0

The streaking Independent Builders rang up their 8th straight Industrial softball triumph Friday night by nipping the Torrance Post Office 2-0 behind the seven-hit windmill pitching of Andy Johnson at Torrance Park.

Johnson fanned 11 and showed perfect control by not walking a batter.

**THE WINNERS** — leading the league by just one game over the South Bay Church of God — collected only six hits off losing chucker Jerry Duval but two errors by the Postmen were all the Builders needed to keep their unbeaten winning string alive.

Larry Moorehead's double in the third inning provided Johnson with the only run he really needed as Jim Rogers — who was on via an infield error scampered across.

In other games this week, the second division Border Markets crew came to life with three home runs and 14 bases on balls, blasted Lucy's Lams 22-7; Hank Hazelwood set the Harbor Hornets down on just two hits and struck out 14 in a 6-0 victory as Maury's Cafe remained three games out of first place.

**HARVEY** Aluminum smashed 10 base hits—three by first-baseman Ralph Miller — in squashing the Aeronca nine 18-1 in an abbreviated three inning contest.

Second place South Bay Church of God—behind the four hit slants of Jim Reynolds—set down Ryan Aeros 12-1 as the churchmen pounded 12 safeties.

Tak Aoki, churchmen shortstop, led the hit parade with three bingles. Reynolds—who had a shaky first inning start, giving up three hits and a run—settled down to strike out 13 batters and collected two hits himself.

### Gunter Holds Motorcycle Racing Lead

Bulk of the nation's finest motorcycle riders will be competing in the weekly 12-event card of competition at Gardena's Ascot Stadium Friday night.

Following 7 p.m. qualifying, racing starts at 8:30 p.m. Al Gunter, winner of three national championships races and 1957's national dirt track champion, has been the outstanding performer in the first 13 weeks of the season.

Expected to provide the toughest competition in the expert class this week are Stu Morley, Don Hawley, Troy Lee and Sammy (The Flying Flea) Tanner.

Elliot Schultz and Preston Petty, the two who have been conducting a torrid rivalry in the novice races, are again heavy favorites in their division.

#### DODGER NOTES

Dodger shortstop Maury Wills has stolen a total of 288 bases during the nine years of his career, an average of 32. And he matched that average last year when he grabbed 25 at Spokane in 48 games and seven for the Dodgers. Strangely, he was caught in his first three Dodger attempts, then reeled off seven in a row down the pennant stretch.

## Star Studded Cast to Compete

Don Carter, four time national champion, and a select field of 11 of the most famous names in the new Professional Bowlers' Assn. have filed entries for the first annual Southern California Open which starts Wednesday and will run thru Saturday at the Bowl-O-Drome in Torrance.

The four-day championships—featuring a star-studded cast of 192 national and local performers and drawing national attention is part of a PBA experiment to offer top-flight competitive entertainment and develop the appeal of bowling as a spectator sport.

**THE TOURNEY** is the final stop on the PBA's 1960 summer trail and \$24,200 is up for grabs in lucrative prize money. \$3000 will go to the winner with the 48 finalists on July 9 assured of \$150 or more.

Entry fees of \$100 per person plus a \$5000 backing by co-sponsor Alex Schreiber and Family Enterprises (Bowl-O-Brome owners) guarantees the top prize fund.

Local bowling bugs will have their first chance to see the nation's top kegling artists first hand during the meet as already the complete lineups of the National Champion Budweisers, and the Falstaffs have filed their entries.

**BESIDES** Carter, Ray Bluth, Tom Hennessey, Pat Patterson and Dick Weber of the Buds and Harry Smith, 1960 national all-star champion, Billy Welu, Glenn Allison, Steve Nagy, Dick Hoover, and Al Savas of the Falstaff team have signed and paid the \$100 entry fees.

Weber and Carter won the first and third PBA tournaments at the start of the summer tour in the East.

All of the others have ranked among the nation's finest on many previous occasions.

Schreiber—who firmly believes in bowling's appeal as a spectator sport—has scaled his reserved seat prices moderately in light of the limited facilities and in comparison with some golf tournaments.

**ALL RESERVED** seats (180) and standing room (320) are being sold on a first-come, first serve basis. The prices range from \$5.50 to \$2.10.

The tourney will be held twice daily, approximately 4½ hours each, starting at noon and at 7 p.m. July 6-7-8; and at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. for the finals on July 9.

The Southern California Open is the sixth and final tournament on the PBA tour with the exception of the first PBA national, slated in November at Memphis, Tennessee.

### House Passes Fish And Wildlife Studies Bill

Fish and wildlife studies of California's Mumboldt Bay and Russian River have been approved by the House of Representatives.

Congressman Clem Miller of California announced that the studies would begin July 1. Their main purpose is to insure any proposed navigation and flood control improvements will not damage fish and wildlife resources. Congressman Miller said wherever opportunities for fish and wildlife enhancement are discovered, they will be recommended.

The elusive, predictable silverfish will be making their third run of a four night stand and are expected to conclude their landings tomorrow night from 11:30 to 12:30.

The tiny grunion may be found on smooth, wet sand after a wave as they come in on extremely high tides on the three to four nights that follow a new or full moon to deposit their eggs in dark, sandy areas.

Flashlights are useful, but should be used only when a wave has receded.

The grunion may be taken by hand only. There is no bag limit.

### ECC Mat Coach Re-elected To Presidency Post

El Camino College Coach Dave Hengsteler has started his third consecutive term as president of the Southern California Coaches and Officials Association following his election to that post.

Heading the organization which covers the district from Santa Monica to Torrance, Hengsteler states, "Our organization is growing stronger, and is steadily reaching its goal of improved officiating and coaching which indicates why we have some of the finest wrestling teams in the state."

Three years ago at Tanforan he set a record by winning nine straight races, nearly all of them long shots, over a three-day period.

**THE FIRST** "big horse" Threewitt trained was Robert S. Lytle's Correlation, who

won two \$100,000 races, the Florida Derby and the Wood Memorial.

Threewitt saddled Cerise Reine to win the Santa Margarita in 1954, but he considers Honeys Gem, owned by Ed Janss and Dr. Jack Robbins of Conejo Ranch, the best mare he ever trained. He took her to Chicago last year to win the Beverly Handicap, and she ran the fastest mile—1:34—ever registered by one of her sex. Threewitt has had Janss' horses ever since 1941.

### DFG Warns 'Pass up That Fawn' -- Mama's Near By

When you go on your vacation trip this year, leave any "orphan fawns" — or young of any other animal — right where you see them.

This is an annual appeal made by the California Department of Fish and Game to vacationers.

They are not really "orphans", the Department points out. Their mothers are usually hiding in nearby brush and are fully capable of taking care of their youngsters.

Children, and grown-ups, too, find it difficult to resist the impulse to pick up a little fawn that appears to be "lost".

There are two reasons why you should pass up the "orphan":

(1) If you take it home, bottle-feed it and raise it, it will eventually become the family pet — unless someone reports it to the game warden before hand. Then one day the family pet reverts to nature and injures someone.

(2) It is against the law to possess a fawn and stiff fines have been assessed for this transgression.

The best advice is to leave the babes in the woods.

The Wollard-Stout team has taken every American pairs title from novice through senior class in the four years they have been skating in competition together.

The Southern California "kids" defeated a team that had won the United States' senior title five years and the world title two years to cop the 1959 trophy at Boston last July.

The teen-aged duo had placed second in the world championships at Auckland, New Zealand in January, 1959.

Wollard, 19, of 1434 Fern Ave., is also the American senior men's free skating champion. Eighteen-year-old Carol Stout is a resident of Orange and the pair represent the Pleasure Time Skating Club of Long Beach.

They have been developed and coached by Ray Hough.

Some 2500 local and district winners will compete in speed and figure skating in the Southwest Pacific championships at the Pan.

Roller skaters from Arizona, Nevada and California are entered in the regionals, where state titles also will be contested in the week-long eliminations.

Wollard, a 1958 graduate of Torrance High School, has been skating competitively, since 1953.

**McGuire Sparks Red Sox to 3-1 Pony League Win**
