

Harbor Savings and Loan To Erect New Structure

A new \$250,000 headquarters building for rapidly growing Harbor Savings and Loan Assn. at South Redondo Beach is scheduled to start construction this fall. Joseph A. Wall, association president, announced this week.

ing at what is to be known as Harbor Savings Square, 1617 South Pacific Coast Hwy., is planned for early in 1961.

THE TWO-STORY 15,000 sq. ft. building marks the second expansion of the savings institution in three years. Its resources now exceed \$7 million. Building design provides for a 3000 sq. ft. expansion with the entire rear wall built as a knock-out panel to care for the anticipated growth.

HIGHLIGHTING the building will be a 70 foot high cylindrical pylon ribbed at one-foot intervals by colored neon

tubing. The white surfaced pylon with its lighthouse theme will be seen at a considerable distance in all directions.

A limited use of partitions on the first floor of the building, except where absolutely required for office privacy, will create a wide, spacious appearance in the main banking facility.

A **FEELING OF** space also has been developed by raising the banking area ceiling above the surrounding roof. In this roof section clerestory windows will filter sunlight throughout the core of the building.

tends around three sides of the building, a separate entrance to the second floor and a covered driveway at the side of the structure are other features. The drive leads to the ample parking lot at the rear.

GROUND FLOOR glass walls are sun protected by an eight foot wide overhang. The entire second floor is protected by a curtain of colored aluminum louvers.

The open core which runs through the building to the roof is surrounded by a balcony on the second floor. Here nine office areas vary upwards from 450 sq. ft. All units

open onto the balcony.

A **LARGE** community room with kitchenette on the second floor will be designed to accommodate local civic group meetings.

Entrance from the balcony to the banking facilities on the ground floor will be closed-off at night by a full height decorative metal screen.

BUILDING WALLS near the front entrance will be Italian glass mosaic, with all exposed outside columns marble covered.

The unusually wide entrance itself will have a pattern of colored cement and quarry tile. Landscaping will carry out an oriental motif.
