# Aug. 1 Deadline For Employers Wage Reports

Monday, Aug. 1, is the deadline for filing California Unemployment Insurance wage reports and paying state unemployment insurance taxes for the second quarter of 1960. W. P. Nebergall, Auditor in Charge for the State Department of Employment in Long Beach today reminded employers.

Employers who fail to file wage reports and pay second quarter taxes on or before August 1, will reduce their chances of receiving a lower rate next year. Nebergall pointed out that it is not possible to use payments made after August 1 in computing employer tax rates. In addition, penalty and interest will be charged if the report is filed after the deadline.

# Cancellation Won't Affect Firm's Work

Cancellation of the Corvus missile project by the U. S. Navy will not significantly affect work backlogs of Horkey-Moore Associates, E. J. Horkey, president of the Torrance engineering firm announced today.

Under contract from Temco Electronics and Missiles Co., the prime contractor for the rocket-powered air-to-surface guided missile, Horkey-Moore designed, manufactured and tested the launching mechanism which forcibly separated the Corvus from its pylon.

**THE HORKEY-MOORE** pylon-mounted ballistic force ejection equipment was used on the first successful air launch of the missile from a Douglas A4D Skyhawk.

Subsequent to that contract, Horkey-Moore received a contract from Temco for the development and testing of a system for the production launching mechanism.

ACCORDING to Horkey, the development phase of the work has been completed and only the testing under Temco direction is affected by the cancellation. This work amounts to one quarter of one per cent of the Horkey-Moore backlog, he added.

Horkey-Moore is engaged in design and development, manufacture and testing of a wide variety of aircraft and missile component systems and subsystems.

# CC Resolution Calls For Water Contract

The Board of Directors of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce has fired off a copy of a resolution calling for a contract bid on the proposed Feather River Project to Gov. Brown in Sacramento. It asks that state officials engaged in water contract negotiations submit a proposed contract with the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California so that the "people of Torrance may be able to reach a decision as to their position with regard to the water bond issue" that will appear on the November 8 ballot.

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
