## Harbor College Schedules Fall Entrance Tests

Everyone who intends to enroll as a new day student at Harbor College for the fall session is urged to take the pre-registration entrance-guidance tests as soon as possible, college officials stated today.

Veterans attending evening college on veterans' bill are also required to take the examinations.

THE TESTS will be given Friday, Aug. 5, at 1 p.m.; Saturday, Aug. 13, at 9 a.m.; Friday, Aug. 19, at 8:30 a.m.; Monday, Aug. 29, at 6 p.m.; and Saturday, Sept. 3, at 9 a.m.

Those who wish to take the tests should call the college admissions office for a specific appointment for one of these dates.

The tests cannot be given after Sept. 3 because of heavy enrollments and the impossibility of processing late examinations in time for registration.

"OUR ENTRANCE-guidance tests and the subsequent interviews are designed to assist each student in choosing the type of educational program from which he will receive greatest benefit.

"Everyone who intends to enroll at Harbor College, including vocational nursing students, will benefit by taking the tests and may secure further information by calling the college," William H. McMasters, Dean of Admissions and Guidance, said.

## Local Schools Reject Annual Election Move

A move of the Bellflower Unified School District to stir up interest for annual school board elections has failed to gain any support in Torrance.

Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of the local school board, told the Bellflower backers of the change that the local school board through the election every other year was "a fine thing."

"The chances for a complete change of board members out of three candidates are rather remote; and if there is such a thing, probably it is deserved and necessary," Dr. Hull wrote.

The Bellflower action was based on the contention that a five-member board could lose half of its membership, disrupting the "continuity of school board membership."
