

Yellowtail Lead Changes

Lead in the 15th annual San Diego Yellowtail Derby changed hands with lightning like rapidity this week, leaving Steve Frumento of Montebello in the driver's seat with a 28 pound 8 ounce yellow as qualifying in the ninth week of the summer long deep sea angling classic began.

Will Hanes of Costa Mesa began the week in the role of pace setter with a 25-13 yellow but skidded to fifth position before time to serve up the weekly large fish awards.

For a time, Mrs. Rosie Rosenberger, a 73-year-old San Die-

go anglerette, appeared to be safely established as the derby leader with a 27 pound 12 ounce yellow to her credit, but was dethroned at the last minute by Frumento's 28-8 lunger caught from Steve Griffin's Sundown.

Other prize winning yellows of the week included a 28 pound 9 ounce caught by Walt McAnally of San Diego, a 25-15 by Marshall Malcolm of San Diego, and a 25-13 by Will Hanes, Costa Mesa. In addition to taking second place, Mrs. Rosenberger also won the women's special award.

Because of the runs of big

Torrance Pair Qualify For State Spike Finals

Mike Thornton and Tony Bareford from Torrance High qualified for the State Track Finals this Saturday by placing second in the mile and fourth in the 880 respectively in the CIF spike Finals held Saturday afternoon at Chaffey High.

Thornton finished second in the mile behind surprise winner Bruce Bess of La Habra, clicking off a 4:16.0 time behind Bess' CIF record shattering 4:15.1. The Tartar ace was also under the old CIF standard of 4:16.9.

In the half mile, Bareford, just a junior, blazed a 1:54.7 to smash his own previous best of 1:56.0 which he had run in the semi-finals just the week before. Bob Delaney from Orange captured the event in 1:53.4.

North Torrance Tony Mance cleared 6 ft. 2 in. in the high jump to tie for fifth place. Mance will not qualify for the State Finals, however, since only the first four places qualify for the big meet. The high jump was won at 6 ft. 7 1/2 in. by Lewis Hoyt of San Marino.

An expected dual in the mile between Thornton and Culver City's Doug Calhoun never materialized as the sophomore from La Habra asserted his domination of the prep milers by decisively defeating the two. Calhoun was also under the old standard, running a 4:16.4.

As expected, powerful Centennial walked away with the CIF title in a meet that saw two national and three additional CIF records shattered.

Forrest Beatty from Glendale missed the world's record by only .2 of a second in the 220 when he stopped the watches at 20.2 for a national prep record. Another national standard fell in the 440 when Compton's Ullis Williams speed-eagled the field with a 46.1 clocking.

CIF records were set in the mile, 880 relay, where Centennial streaked to a 1:26.2, and the shot put as El Ramcho Bills Pace shoved the 12 pound ball 65 ft. 2 3/4 in.

Other games found the Giants defeating the Stars, 23 to 3; the Phils routing the Beavers, 23 to 5; the Orioles cutting down the Athletics, 16 to 6; the Pirates downing the Padre, 13 to 9, and the Red Sox defeating the Seals, 11 to 7.
