Mail Appeal Readied for TB Campaign

Within the next few days, residents of Torrance will receive a mail appeal from the Tuberculosis and Health Assn. seeking contributions for the support of programs in crippling respiratory disease. It was announced today.

Dean L. Sears, 1433 Post Ave., local chairman of the crippling respiratory disease campaign, said that the letters will bring information on chronic respiratory illnesses to local residents along with an appeal for funds to support projects in research, education

and community services. "The pioneer voluntary health agency is now financing more than \$100,000 in programs in chronic respiratory illnesses," Sears said. "An additional \$125,000 is being sought within Los Angeles County to strengthen this effort."

"I hope that all Torrance residents will support the crippling respiratory disease campaign and answer their appeal letters as soon as possible. Funds are urgently needed to carry on research, medical

education and community service programs which should prove of benefit to all residents of our area."

The campaign chairman added that chronic respiratory illnesses such as emphysema, bronchitis and allergies now account for approximately one-fourth of the total days lost from work in industry.


