

South High Student Presented Scholarship by Local Industry

M. D. Schwartz, president of the Pacific Smelting Co., has announced that John Everard Dowsing III, 17-year-old graduated senior from South High School has been awarded the 1961 Pacific Smelting Foundation educational scholarship. This will be the fifth scholarship awarded to a high school senior in the Torrance High School system by this foundation.

The Pacific Smelting Foundation educational scholarship is exclusively for seniors in the Torrance Unified School System who desire to obtain a mathematic, scientific or engineering degree in an accredited university. The recipient of this scholarship is chosen by the foundation's committee on the basis of scholastic record, character, citizenship, leadership, aptitude and general educational outlook. The applications this year were received from North High, South High, and Torrance High Schools.

This is the first year that an applicant was selected from South High School, all of these schools being in the Torrance Unified School District.

THE PACIFIC SMELTING Foundation scholarship will provide John with \$500 a year for five years, or a total of \$2500. This will assist him in paying his college expenses. John intends to enroll in the University of California at Los Angeles and major in the field of electronics.

Winners of this scholarship in prior years were: 1957, Laurence L. George, who this semester will graduate from UCLA, having majored in engineering; 1958, Walter A.

Sapp, who is currently attending the University of California at Berkeley and majoring in mathematics; 1959, Howard A. Borer, also attending Berkeley with a major in mathematics; 1960, Larry A. Staat, attending UCLA and majoring in mathematics.

JOHN IS THE son of John and Frances Dowsing, who resides at 626 Calle de Arboles. He has two brothers and one sister. His brother, Leslie Evans, is a graduate of UCLA and his brother Phillip Quentin Dowsing is a sophomore at South High School in Torrance.



Measles Lead Disease Race

At the end of the month, a total of seven cases were reported in the city of Torrance to take the derby against scarlet fever, which could muster only one reported case, and mumps, which could claim none.

Other diseases reported during the final week included one case of epilepsy, one of hepatitis, and one of syphilis. Two other persons were reported to have suffered a streptococcus infection.
