The 43-voice choir will present a series of thirteen selections, including the song, "Lament to Old Age," written by Bill Grantham, an El Camino alumnus now completing his work in music at Long Beach State College. The number will

be conducted by the composer and the presentation will mark the premiere performance of the work.

ANOTHER special feature of the choral performance will be the ten-part round, "The Happy Birthday Scene" from "Fanny."

The chorus includes recent high school graduates, housewives, an organ builder, men and women from many walks of life representing all age groups.

A 15-year-old Torrance youth has been declared the nation's top young jazz accordionist at the American Accordionists' Assn. national championship competition in Chicago.


Bill Cosby, 911 Pysmith Ave., was awarded the top

The Torrance high school student won the Western States Accordion Championship at the 1960 Western States Ac-

Bill also won a scholarship, presented by the Accordion Teachers Guild, to further his musical studies.

Pen & Quill Hotel Due to Start Construction in Manhattan Soon

Construction begins this month on a three-acre corner property site at 3421 Sepulveda Blvd. The three-story 200-room hotel, offering the most modern conveniences and service facilities, is expected to be completed and ready for occupancy in mid-November.

Bob Reuben, co-owner and president, discloses that the land, building and furnishings represent an investment of nearly two million dollars. Other officers of the corporation are William Reuben, Leonard Reuben and Ira Schwartz.

Summer Gardener Can be Fooled By Sudden Change of Seasons

Summer has a way of sneaking up on the gardener. Unlike spring, which is long awaited and long planned for, summer is suddenly here. Which explains, no doubt, why so many gardens are often more colorful in spring than they are now.

If the season caught you napping, start changing things right now while you're thinking about it. By planting a few shrubs and perennials this month, you will have the basic elements of a colorful border next summer, and at the proper time you can add whatever annuals are needed to fill it all in. Need we add that if a plant is bought in bloom, it will give color this summer, too.

START by mapping your plan of attack. Plot areas of sun and shade. Indicate permanent shrubs and any areas of spring bloom that shouldn't be hidden. Then visit a neighborhood member of the California Assn. of Nurserymen and let him help you fill in the map.

He will probably start you off with some basic perennials—many of which can be found in gallon nursery cans already in bloom or ready to bloom. Yellow and white Marguerites are a logical starting point. In the middle border, they can act as a background for lower growing perennial asters and as a foreground for taller delphiniums. A foreground of blue perennial asters backed by yellow marguerites and backed again by blue delphinium is something to see.

TALL FIRE brands of the

Red Hot Poker plant fit well into such a border. They are perfect contrast to delphinium and so, too, are the flat yellow heads of fernleaf yarrow. There are other nice color combinations for the summer border, also. Try blending pink perennial asters with white and yellow marguerites, topped by glowing heads of tall pink border phlox and the white shasta daisy.

There's a place for roses in the border, too, especially the bloom-crazy floribundas and grandifloras, as mentioned above, annuals can be added at the appropriate time. Since you'll get bloom from them this summer, the time would seem appropriate now.
