

### Sportsman's Park Gets Golf Links

Continuing with Supervisor Kenneth Hahn's program to develop Southwest Sportsman's Park into the finest regional recreational center in Los Angeles county, the Board of Supervisors has approved final plans and specifications for construction of a nine-hole pitch and putt golf course there, it was announced this week by William N. Stivers, Supervisor Hahn's chief deputy.

In approving construction of the new recreational facility the Board of Supervisors issued a call for bids, which will be opened on Aug. 16. When Supervisor Hahn initiated the project several months ago, he pointed out that the park improvement will make available for public use and enjoyment a large area of the park that is not now being utilized.

HE EXPLAINED that the pitch and putt golf course, which will be located in the western portion of the park will become fully self-supporting and is expected to produce a substantial net income to the county. Included in the nearly 10 acres to be developed and improved are two acres of land adjacent to the park leased

by the county from the Los Angeles City department of Water and Power. The lease was negotiated under Supervisor Hahn's leadership to put the land to use for public recreation and cleaning of the land, which fronts on Century Blvd. Plans for the golf course includes grading, landscaping, construction of greens and fairways, a practice green clubhouse, pro shop, patio, starter house, and off-street parking. The golf course will be fully fenced. LOCATED IN the geographical center of Supervisor Hahn's district at Century Blvd. and Western Ave., Sportsman's park is a regional recreational facility designed to serve the citizens of a large area including South Los Angeles, Inglewood, Lennox, Hawthorne, Moneta Gardens, Lawndale, Gardena, Torrance, Howard Townsite, Woodcrest, and adjoining communities. About five months will be required to complete construction of the new golf course after the contract has been awarded. SUPERVISOR HAHN has
