Harbor News Reporter Commissioned in Army

Dolores Hubik, harbor news reporter for more than nine years, will leave next month for active duty with the United States Army.

She is commissioned as a first lieutenant in the Women's Army Corps and will report Aug. 25 as Fort McClellan, Ala., for the WAC Officers Orientation Course.

She will end her duties at the San Pedro News-Pilot on July 28 and will then vacation for two weeks with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Hubik of 2529 W. 157th St., Gardena.

Lt. Hubik received a direct commission as an officer in the United States Army Reserve. Her papers were processed through the San Pedro Army Recruiting Station, 462 W. Sixth St., San Pedro, directed by M/Sgt. Wallace Bell.

Graduated from the University of Southern California School of Journalism in June, 1951. Lt. Hubik began her newspaper career in the Antelope Valley with the Lancaster Ledger-Gazette.

Eight months later she came to the News-Pilot as woman's editor, filling that position almost four years. She was then transferred to the News-Pilot desk of suburban editor.

In the past few years her

news duties have varied from general assignment reporting and photography to that of special feature writer.

She is a member of the Los Angeles Chapter of Theta Sigma Phi, national fraternity (professional) for women in journalism. She has been affiliated with the Harbor District Soroptimists and San Pedro Theater Arts and is active with the San Pedro Toastmistress club and the Harbor Catholic Alumni Club of Long Beach.

A new 13-week nationally televised series entitled "Navy's Film of the Week" has been announced by the U.S. Navy Recruiting Aids Facility.

Jobs Available For Instructors In LA Schools

Full-time and day-to-day substitute teacher positions are available in the south part of the Los Angeles City School district, according to an announcement by W. B. Brown, associate superintendent, personnel division.

Starting salaries for full-time positions range from \$5000 to \$7210. Day-to-day substitute teachers earn from \$25 to \$33.50 each day they work. In addition, they earn Christmas and Easter vacation pay and regular salary increments.

Substitute teachers must be available two consecutive days or more each week.

Films Available To Public From Phone Company

To add zest to your summer meetings why not borrow motion pictures from General Telephone Company 'free of charge,' suggested J. M. White, Palos Verdes District Manager, this week to chairmen of local school, church and civic groups, service clubs and other organizations.

Three new films, now available by writing or calling the local telephone office, are "Civil Defense in Schools," "Radiological Defense," and "Bowling."

"CIVIL Defense in Schools," a black and white, 23 minute Civil and Defense Mobilization film, is geared to the college and adult level and provides practical guidelines for the development of civil defense in

schools. In a step-by-step review, school and civil defense officials are shown working together in planning and activating plans to protect our children, now, and to prepare them for adult life in the nuclear age. This film is of special value to school boards, administrators, and staffs. It is also of interest to parents and school connected groups.

"RADIOLOGICAL Defense," produced by the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization, is a 28 minute color film. This film, in effectively presenting the menace of radioactive fallout, describes how fallout is produced and explains its effects on people, on livestock and on crops. The nation's radiological defense program at all levels of government is

likewise described in some detail. Throughout the picture, fallout shelter is stressed as the best means to protect the greatest number of people in the event of nuclear war.

"BOWLING," an adult color film, running 14 minutes, is produced by Brunswick Corporation. Although "wordless," the music's tempo, the facial expressions of the bowlers, and the artistry of the cameraman make this a wonderfully different film. Trick shots are also included by Star Bowler Don Ellis.

General's film library, consisting of 232 film titles, with multiple prints of most of the titles includes many topics other than telephone subjects appealing to all age groups.

Tax Forms Due for Revision

R. A. Riddell, District Director of Internal Revenue, announced that, as an initial step in improving the individual income tax return, the better features of both Forms 1040 and 1040W will be utilized in developing a new Form 1040 for 1961.

Form 1040W will be discontinued as a separate form. No major changes are contemplated for the punch card Form 1040A.

Form 1040 is the general purpose individual income tax

return, whereas the two-part Form 1040W was introduced in 1959 for use by individual taxpayers whose incomes consist primarily of wages.

Details of the revision of Form 1040 for 1961 will be announced well before the filing period.

District Director Riddell also advised that existing stocks of the Withholding Tax Statement, Form W-2 for 1961, are still usable, notwithstanding the reference on such form to Form 1040W.
