
Liken is a member of Headquarters Battery in the division's 28th Artillery in Baumholder. He entered the Army last January and completed basic training at Fort Ord.

Rich argosies of the air now traverse oceans and uncharted skies; and fleets of air artillery taking wings in the morning may, with swift and stealthy flight, by night rain death and destruction upon unsuspecting peoples thousands of miles away. And the newer and deadlier intercontinental Ballistic Missiles may accomplish this in a matter of minutes.

The price of liberty is eternal. What was won at Lexington and Concord and Bunker Hill had to be repurchased at Ticonderoga and Yorktown.

What John Paul Jones achieved upon the high seas in the War of Independence had to be repurchased by Commodore Perry on Lake Erie in the War of 1812.

The prestige of Admiral Dewey's victory at Manila Bay in 1898 was rewon by naval battles in the seas about the far-distant Archipelagoes and atolls of the Pacific, after the perfidious sneak attack upon Pearl Harbor and Manila in 1941 had summoned our Country to assume its role in World War II.

What our troops achieved under the Stars and Stripes at Chateau-Thierry and Flanders in World War I, their sons were required to repurchase in World War II in the bloody trek across Northern Africa, and in the Battle of the Bulge.

The Flag our American boys raised at Iwo Jima was the same Flag later raised in defense of far-off Korea.

This is indeed one world of many nations. Man's inventive genius has brought them closer together, but only in time and distance. Nearness is not oneness. Common ideals and principles alone can unite them.

The Communistic Ideology of World Domination and subjugation of the masses does not fit into this pattern.

So let us, as Americans who desire to preserve our great Heritage and pass it on to our children and our children's children, answer the call of the Grand Exalted Ruler of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of the United States of America, and join in a militant aggressive anti-communistic crusade.

Let us stand and be counted. Let us show our colors. Let us fly the Stars and Stripes from our home and our places of business, not only on patriotic holidays, but on every day.

Let us proclaim to all: "America is on guard!"

## Dollars for Democrats Drive Set

(Continued From Page 1) pilot whale would be named "Buttons" and would soon be doing such tricks as singing, dancing and leaping completely out of the water, along with the other members of the whale troupe.

MONAHAN reported that the young whale, probably not over four year old, was captured today in the ocean less than 10 miles from Marineland by the oceanarium's collecting

crew aboard the vessel Geronimo. The whale was taken by Capt. Frank Brocato, chief collector of specimens for Marineland, and his assistant, Frank Calandrino. They are the only two men in history to capture a whale alive in the open sea and bring it ashore for public display.

After Buttons was placed in the whale tank, she immediately touched noses with Bimbo, the biggest whale in captivity in the world and the undisputed boss of the whale colony at Marineland. She was ac-

cepted at once into the whale community and began swimming around the tank with Bimbo, Bubbles and a third whale, Bubbles II.

MARINELAND now has four whales in captivity. Whale shows are staged six times daily, every day of the year. David Brown, curator of mammals, said the new whale will be placed in training at once. He estimated her weight at 1000 pounds and said she appeared to be a vigorous, intelligent animal.
