Warrior Trustees Honor 'Warwhoop' Advisor

W. A. (Bill) Kamrath, journalism instructor and coordinator of public relations at El Camino college, has been commended by formal resolution of the board of trustees, Stuart E. Marsee, president of the college, announced this week.

With gratitude, the trustees commended Kamrath for eight years of service as a teacher and adviser whose achievements include direction of the student newspaper "Warwhoop," winner of the Pace-maker award of the American Newspapers Publishers Assn.

EL CAMINO, the first junior college to receive the award, shared 1961 honors with the University of Minnesota, the University of San Francisco, the University of Miami and the University of Florida.

It was noted further in the resolution that the "Warwhoop" received fifteen consecutive All-American awards for the Associated Collegiate Press.

He received the Bronze Star for Meritorious Service, as well as the Combat Infantry badge. He and his wife, Margaret, reside with their children: Kimberly, 2; Gregory, 5, and Douglas, 12, at 125 Corregidor on the Fort Ord reservation.


Included in the commendation list of the resolution is the part played by Kamrath in the interpretation of services and opportunities offered by the young college to the community it serves.
