Scout Named Alternate to N.Y. Confab

Terry Kruso of 21326 Grant Ave. has been named an alternate delegate to the national meeting of the American Rocket Society in New York City on Oct. 7 which will be attended by eight Explorer Scouts.

The Torrance youth is a member of Post 783X, Centinela Scout District. The eight Explorers and their four alternates were selected as outstanding participants in the year-long Space Science Exposition presented by the Los Angeles Area Council of the Boy Scouts and the American Rocket Society.

AS THEIR term project, 27 Explorers built a simulated space capsule, with the help of rocket experts.

The capsule has room for one explorer to sit, while wires are attached to his body. In front of him is an oscilloscope with a red dot in the center. The Explorer in the capsule has the problem of keeping the red dot in dead center of the scope, while another Explorer changes the dot's pattern by means of electronic equipment outside the capsule.

He has just three seconds in which to solve each problem. While this is going on, his temperature, pulse and respiration are measured by means of complicated needles and graphs.

The entire exhibit, built by Explorers, was shown at the Sectional Meeting of the American Rocket Society at the Ambassador Hotel in June. From this, came the invitation to New York.

THEY WILL leave Oct. 7 for the convention, and return Oct. 15. While in New York, the local Explorers will be guests of New York City Explorers.

The Space Science Exposition started in May, 1960, when 750 Explorers met for one day to hear speakers and see exhibits on space science.

A series of lectures continued all winter, and the term project was the space capsule. Dr. J. Gordon Wells of Northrop Aviation and R. J. Gunkel of Douglas Aircraft were chairmen of the third phase and the term project.

Dr. Wells will also act as chairman of the group of Explorers bound for New York City, with their space capsule.

Annual Disneyland Appearance Stated By Five Dixieland Bands

Half a hundred of the world's great Dixieland jazzmen will come to "float" down the river" at Disneyland on Saturday night, Sept. 30, trumpets blowing and banjos strumming, when the second annual "Dixieland at Disneyland" show rocks the Magic Kingdom with New Orleans music and fun.

Louis Armstrong, the Yankee Doodle Grande of Jazz (born on the Fourth of July, 1900, in New Orleans), heads the star-studded list of Dixieland talent that outshines even the first annual affair.

Joining the great "Satchmo" for the jazz festival will be: Teddy Buckner and His Dixieland Band; The Firehouse Five Plus Two; The Young Men From New Orleans; Matty Matlock and His Dixieland All-Stars; The Disneyland Strawhatters; and the Albert McNeil Choir.

Like the first "Dixieland at Disneyland" held in the Magic Kingdom a year ago, this year's program will begin on the park's Rivers of America with the "Salute to Dixieland" show.

Each Dixieland band will float down the river on a raft bathed in blue, white and aqua spotlights. Each band will play in its own distinctive style.

For the finale, more than 50 jazz artists board the Mark Twain riverboat. Under a giant display of fireworks exploding on the water and in the air, the sternwheeler, ablaze with lights, will round the bend with musicians playing "When The Saints Come Marching In."

At show's end, a torchlight parade will start at the riverboat docks and wind its way through the streets. Bands will play, leading their followers to six locations in Disneyland where they will perform for dancing and listening until 2 a.m.

The entire Magic Kingdom turns out in full operation for "Dixieland at Disneyland." The all-encompassing ticket is the only "pass" required for every ride and attraction, from Flying Saucers to Monorail, Matterhorn bobsled, Jungle Cruise and Submarine Voyage—every ride as often as desired on the one ticket.

AROUND ARMSTRONG for this night of Dixieland are true veterans of Dixieland and jazz. Teddy Buckner and his Dixieland Band is no stranger to Disneyland.

The great Buckner and his muted trumpet appeared at the first "Dixieland at Disneyland." Like Armstrong, he had his start with Kid Ory in New Orleans. Buckner has been a jazz favorite around Los Angeles for 30 years.

The Young Men From New Orleans, all over 50 years of age, include Dixie veterans Harvey Brooks, Johnny St. Cyr (71 and still king of the banjo), Alton Redd, Mike Delay, and vocalist Monette Moore. All are graduates of the Mississippi Show Boat days.

The Firehouse Five Plus Two have appeared with Armstrong in concerts and jazz festivals and have won universal recognition.

Matty Matlock and the Dixieland All-Stars; the Disneyland Strawhatters; and the Albert McNeil Choir fill out the star studded bill.

On Saturday, Sept. 30, Disneyland's regular daytime operation will terminate at 7 p.m. The park will then close for an hour and reopen at 8 p.m. for holders of "Dixieland at Disneyland" tickets. The river show is set for 9 p.m. with Disneyland remaining open for all rides and attractions, dancing and listening until 2 a.m.
