

# Torrance High Wallops Aviation

Hurdling one of its biggest obstacles in the way to a second straight Pioneer League championship, Torrance High whipped slightly favored Aviation, 26 to 13 in a crucial football tilt Friday evening on the Tartar gridiron.

Fiery quarterback John Cambon pitched three touchdowns through the air to give the undefeated Tartars the margin of victory.

Two of Cambon's aerial bombs were received by end Newell Robinson for touchdowns. The other air-

score for the Tartars came on a Cambon to George Ojard completion.

Alan Billings, out with an injury for the first couple of league games, came back with a bang, scoring Torrance's other TD.

Torrance, Aviation and Culver City finished in a three way tie for first place in the Pioneer League last season, and Aviation was picked by the experts to gain sole possession of the crown this time around. But, an opening loss to Culver City and Friday night's defeat have all but eliminated the Falcons' title chances.

It now appears that the Tartars and Culver City will battle it out for the loop championship on Nov. 3 when the Centaurs invade the All-American city to battle it out on the THIS gridiron.

Torrance can't overlook next week's opponent though or it will be in trouble. El Segundo will host the Tartars and would like nothing better than to pull a major upset, and the Eagles have the guns to do it.

Taking advantage of Cambon's pin-point passing, the Tartars scored on quick marches, while forcing Aviation to tally only after long, exhausting marches on the ground.

Although boasting fine speed in their press-clippings, the Falcon backs did not show it Friday night, continually bursting through the Torrance line only to be hauled down by the THIS linebackers.

Noted primarily this season for their bruising ground-attack, the Tartars found their running-game

stymied and were forced to the air where Cambon's aerials searched out and found the Falcon's weakness.

Bob Hettig, operating from the quarterback position, punched over Aviation's first score in the second quarter. Fullback Ed Noble plunged over for the second Falcon tally in the final period.

Noble booted the Aviation PAT while Jerry McLean kicked two for the winners.

Torrance now rests in a first place tie with Culver City for the Pioneer League title. THIS has ran roughshod over Lawndale, 43 to 21 and posted a slim 12 to 6 win over determined Beverly Hills in its other league starts.

Next week's foe, El Segundo, rambled to a 33 to 6 win over Lennox Friday night and poses a definite threat to the Tartars title hopes.

It was a close game until the final quarter when the Eagles erupted for 20 points to smother the weaker Lennox eleven.

Four different backs carried the pigskin for touchdowns for the Eagles. Frank Dearth was the big man for El Segundo, scoring one touchdown and three PATs for a total of nine points.

It was a disappointing loss for Aviation as the Falcons were trying to gain revenge for last year's 21 to 6 defeat at the hands of Torrance that ended an eight-game winning streak and knocked Aviation out of an undisputed Pioneer League title while boosting the Tartars into a tie for the crown.

## Saxon Win Shocks Morningside Champion Hopes

### Overconfident South Nipped by Redondo

Taking advantage of an overconfident South grid squad and a pair of missed conversions, Redondo slipped to a 14 to 12 victory Friday night on the Seahawk field.

Starting off with a bang, South recovered the opening kickoff on the Redondo 22 yard line and scored in four plays with 9:50 left in the first quarter. Phil Fish went over for the six points, galloping 14 yards around end.

Disaster, in the form of injuries, then struck the Spartans as three key players were injured in the next five plays. Vance White, Victor Grava and Dave Garrison were the injured trio. Garrison came back in the latter stages of the contest, but was of no use to South.

THE TWO teams battled scorelessly then until the third period when Don Hobbs intercepted a Spartan pass on the South 43, and in 10 plays the Seahawks had moved into the lead with one minute left in the third quarter.

The score came on a trick play as quarterback Bob Johnson lateraled to halfback Jon Fowler who threw 15 yards to Bob Laurella in the end zone.

THE TD came on a fourth down and 15 yards to go situation.

REDONDO then assumed a 7 to 6 lead as Fowler ran over the PAT. Garrison had missed in his attempt after the South tally.

A bad kick presented Redon-

do with its opportunity for the eventual winning touchdown when a poor punt rolled out of bounds on the Redondo 42.

WAYNE WILLIS, fullback, climaxed a 10 play drive that had gone all the way on the ground by punching over from two yards out. The score came with 6:30 left in the game and Fowler's jaunt into the end zone for the extra points ruined Sparta's hopes for a possible tie.

South climaxed the scoring with one minute left in the game when Fish took an eight yard pass from Dan Ely in the flat for the score.

BOB WOODRUM had set up the score, recovering a Redondo fumble on a punt on the Seahawks 44 yard line. Ely threw five passes to Ken Turner to move the ball to the goal then switching to Fish, scored the TD conversion.

Harvey Seigel missed the conversion.

LOOKING AHEAD to the inter-city titanic with North high next week, the Spartans underestimated the Redondo gridders and were stung with the defeat.

All was not bad news for Sparta though as Ely began finding the range through the air in the latter parts of the game and an interior line of Dave Birmingham, Tom Carrol, Dave Fulford and Bob Anderson demonstrated tremendous strength in all but holding Redondo inside the ten-yard line on the Seahawk's final touchdown drive.

## Mighty Bakersfield Eleven Ruins Harbor Grid Hopes

Smashing Harbor College's visions of a strong football powerhouse and a fourth upset win in five starts, Bakersfield College's undefeated gridders thrashed the Seahawks 42 to 0 Friday night in a Metropolitan Conference contest on the HJC gridiron.

Bakersfield, scoring once in each of the first two periods, and twice in the third and fourth quarters, had a 22 to 6 edge in first downs and did not have to punt the entire contest.

The Renegades also intercepted four Harbor passes, but the Sea-Hawks were not as lucky as the Metro powerhouse totaled 106 yards with their own passing attack.

DEMONSTRATING their depth and versatility, six Renegades packed the ball for six pointers. The 'Gades chalked up 402 yards on the ground, eating up huge chunks of yardage on every play.

The victory was the fifth in a row for Bakersfield, and the 'Gades have now scored 230 points this season against their opponents' 14. The only team that has managed to score against Bakersfield was El Camino, who scored all of its

points in a second half surge.

HOPING TO avenge last year's 62 to 7 defeat, Harbor just did not have the guns to cope with the Renegades who have won 34 of their last 35 games. The Renegades last defeat came at the hands of Long Beach last year in the 'Gades' own stadium and eliminated eliminated them from the Metropolitan Conference title and a Junior Rose Bowl bid.

Harbor had hoped to be able to combat Bakersfield's speed and depth with a strong line and a speedy backfield of its own, but it was to have no such luck as the gridiron powers took control of the game at the

start and completely routed the Seahawks.

THE SEAHAWKS will find the opposition no easier in their next battle since the foe is Long Beach, last season's west coast Junior Rose Bowl representative, and winner of the Pasadena classic.

THE VIKINGS are once again ranked with the top team in the land, whipping every foe this season.

DESPITE LOSING a large part of its line, the Vikings have maintained their powerful backfield that has raised havoc with every foe faced so far this year.

## North Ends Monarch Jinx, Takes 29 to 26 Thriller

The lone Saxon first half score came with just 27 seconds left before the half when quarterback Jeff Bell scrambled nine yards on a keeper play for the tally. Richard Parker kicked the extra point.

SAXON MENTOR Bob Shoup must have given his men a tremendous pep-talk at the half, for when they emerged from the dressing room, they were a different team.

The Saxons scored four times in the final half of the contest to take the lead. The first score came when Morningside halfback Rus Forman was trapped in the end-zone for a safety.

TWO MINUTES later, North scored again on a pass from Jeff Bell to Skip Mooney good for 41 yards out.

With just three minutes gone in the fourth period, quarterback Norm Dow took the ball on a keeper and went up the

middle for eight yards and a North touchdown.

THE FINAL North score came when Joe Castorena took a hand-off from Bell and tore across from 16 yards out.

Morningside's only score in the second half came when Steward scored his second TD of the contest, going over from one yard out.

NORTH'S big game of the year comes up Friday when the Saxons meet cross-town rival South at Torrance High in what should be a tremendous game.

Both teams have had mediocre success this season, but one thing is assured when the two clubs meet, it will be a real melee.
