Know Your Traffic Laws

Many times the driving public in any city questions the enforcement of traffic laws by the local police department. The public at times thinks the enforcement is too rigid with not nearly enough warnings given, too much importance attached to the so-called minor traffic violations, or too much time spent bothering the driving public instead of catching burglars and bank robbers.

In the city of Torrance, traffic enforcement is conducted on a selected enforcement basis. Selective enforcement is simply enforcement in areas or locations where the greater number of traffic accidents occur or where too many violations are occurring and the hazard is the greatest. In other words, there is nothing haphazard about where the traffic units and motorcycles are working. Rather they are at different locations for a specific purpose, working a particular type of accident-causing violation. This type of enforcement is aimed at those violations that are causing accidents and working in areas that need to be worked on statistics obtained over the course of the year.

THERE IS no such thing as a minor traffic violation. They all are capable of killing or maiming. One has only to check traffic statistics to find out that many of our traffic fatalities were due to one of those so-called minor violations. One thing is certain, traffic enforcement is only one of many phases of police work covered by every police officer.

FIRST, every man on the department is a police officer sworn to protect life and property. This includes all facets of police work.

Secondly, he works his specific assignment. Certainly no traffic citation is more important than catching a bank robber or burglar. Rest assured that any time a bank is robbed, a burglar is breaking into a house or business, or any other such crime is committed you will find policemen from many

different type details at the scene ready to assist in any way they can.

PERHAPS YOU are wondering what selective enforcement has done in our own city. In 1960 Torrance showed a reduction in traffic accidents of about 21 per cent over the year of 1959. So far this year we are showing a reduction over 1960.

To show a reduction in accidents as we have, considering the growth of our city in recent years, tends to reflect the enforcement policies of the police department, showing they are good and are obtaining results. It also shows the driving public is aware of the and by practical application, our drivers have assisted in reducing our accident rate.


WHEN ANY city is able to show a reduction in accidents in this day and age, particularly anywhere in Southern California, this shows that a determined effort between the driving public and the police department can and will produce good results.

No police department can properly function or be effective without the aid and help of the general public.
