From a studio, a network television program is sent first to a telephone company TV-control center like the one shown at right. From here, the television picture speeds along a network of special telephone circuits to stations in other cities for broadcasting to homes. At check points across the land, the program is carefully watched on monitoring screens. Highly trained telephone men check constantly so you'll get the best possible picture on your television set.



In this way telephone people help bring you television from the entertainment capitals of the nation.




