
NORTH HIGH

United Nations Contest For Students Announced

Plans for the 36th Annual High School Contest on the United Nations have been announced by Inez Smith, chairman of the education program of the American Association for the United Nations, Harbor Area chapter.

The contest is open to all High School students which includes the ninth grade of the Junior High Schools. Last year, more than 75,000 students from more than 3,000 high schools participated. The contest consists of an examination which tests the student's knowledge of the history and structure of the United Nations.

The examination is based on two booklets, "The UN - What It Is", and "The UN - What It Does", which are made available to students through the AAUN.

Miss Smith, the Harbor Area chairman, said, "The examination will be given throughout the United States on Jan. 18, 1962. The first prize for the national winner is a trip to Europe, under the sponsorship of the American Youth Hostels, Inc., or \$500 toward a college scholarship. Second national prize is a trip

to Mexico, also sponsored by AYH, or \$200 toward a college scholarship. Third national prize is a trip to New York City and the United Nations. In addition, all three national winners will appear as guests on the March 18 telecast of the "Adlai Stevenson Reports" program.

In addition to the national prizes, the Harbor Area Chapter of the AAUN will present prizes to local winners. These will be, senior high school, \$25 U. S. Savings Bond and a book, value \$5 which will be donated to his school library in his name; junior high school, \$10 in U. S. Savings Stamps and a book, value \$5 which will be given to the library in his name.

In the contest last year, Rosanne Minister of the Convent of the Sacred Heart of Menlo Park, was a national finalist, and Daniel Bell of Beverly Hills high school was listed in the national report. From the Harbor Area, Phyllis Monroe of Marymount School, Palos Verdes, received the High School award, and Alan Spesak, Stephen White Junior High School, received the Junior High award.
