Baroness to Be Lecture Forum Guest

The South Bay Lecture Forum will present Baroness Lotte van Strahl Friday at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of the Redondo-Torrance Church of Religious Science, 907 Knob Hill Ave., Redondo Beach.

An escapee of Nazi domination in Germany, the baroness is a fascinating example of European imports. As a world traveler, the baroness has subsequently become a lecturer, personal analyst, consultant, linguist, and developed a super-sensory detection.

SHE HAS demonstrated these talents on television and radio and is well known in this area. How the baroness became an expert in personal analysis and turned her talents to work with nerve specialists as an adviser to law courts, police authorities, banks, and commercial establishments is an interesting story.

In countries where the police knew the value of psychic and psychometric help in tracking down law breakers, the baroness helped untangle many unsolved and puzzling criminal cases.

BORN IN GERMANY as the daughter of the Dutch counsel general in Oldenburg, she lived for many years in Holland before traveling through the world. Her husband was Baron Otto van Strahl of the pre-Hitler diplomatic corps.

The authenticity of her work has been described in the literature of the British and American Societies for Psychic Research. In lectures, the baroness enjoys electrifying audiences with spot analysis. Her topic for Friday night will be "My Extra - Sensory Experiences on Three Continents."
