Polio Clinic At Serra on Thursday Eve

As part of an intensified inoculation program, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis — March of Dimes — and the Serra High Mothers Club will join to conduct a second polio clinic at the school, 14830 South Van Ness Ave., Gardena, Dec. 14, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m.

Mrs. Stanley Rymza, Mothers Club Health Committee chairman, reports that those who attend may receive the type of shot needed, whether it be one of the initial series of three or a booster shot. It is recommended that a period of two to four weeks be allowed between the first and second shots, and four weeks between the second and third. Booster shots should be taken once each year. Those under 21, if not married, must be accompanied by a parent or guardian or have a signed consent slip for the inoculations.

School children will be required, in January, to show proof of polio protection, and Mrs. Rymza is urging parents of Serra students to take advantage of the convenience and economy of the school clinic in preparation for this requirement.
