Miss Schenk was awarded a bronze medallion and \$100 at a luncheon held Tuesday at the Biltmore Hotel, Los Angeles, honoring the winning students.

Students, parents, faculty members and savings and loan executives attended. The formal presentation will be made in June at the high school by Joseph A. Wall, president of Harbor Savings and Loan Assn., sponsor of the awards in the Southwest area. This is the third annual student award made here by Harbor Savings.

# Drive for Reapportionment Petition Signers 'Rolling'

Supervisor Frank G. Bonelli's "crash program" to obtain 420,462 valid signatures voters on the petition to the senate reapportionment measure on the November 1962 ballot is moving forward with the support of the county board of supervisors, the mayor and city council of Los Angeles, leaders of both major parties, labor, management public officials, and civic lead-

ers of the 73 cities of Los Angeles County. Highlighting the campaign, May 14 to 25, is the "Reapportionment Caravan" headed by Councilman John S. Gibson, co-chairman of the Senate Reapportionment Committee of the Los Angeles City Council. The big bus, emblazoned with senate reapportionment logos, began its countywide tour in the San Fernando Valley on Monday and Tuesday. Last Los Angeles County was scheduled for Wednesday and Friday, with other areas to be covered next week.

**MAKING** scheduled stops at public centers, the "Reapportionment Caravan" is loaded with petitions and workers to get signatures from voters of each area. Chambers of commerce, union and civic leaders, service organizations, and public-spirited citizens are cooperating to make the tour a big success by assembling large numbers of registered voters to meet the bus. "We hope that every voter will sign the senate reapportionment petition," said Councilman Gibson. "This is the democratic way of fighting against taxation without representation — the undemocratic situation which exists today in our California State Senate.

"**AS CANDIDATE** for county assessor, I am doubly concerned with the necessity for senate reapportionment, because it offers an opportunity to obtain relief for the overburdened taxpayers of Los Angeles County," Gibson continued.

"The present unfair and archaic system of distributing state tax funds cannot be remedied by legislation until we have an equitable voice in the upper house."

# Probation Office Gets First Okay

Preliminary plans and specifications for construction of Los Angeles County's proposed new \$387,000 Probation Department building in the Torrance civic center complex have been approved by the County Board of Supervisors. Site for the structure as well as the new Superior Court building and off-street parking were provided cost free to the county by the Torrance City Council.

According to County Supervisor Burton W. Chace, plans for the new courthouse, which will cost upwards of two million dollars, are on the drawing board and should be completed by the end of the next fiscal year with construction to begin in the 1963-64 fiscal term.

The Probation Department building will comprise a one-story structure with a small basement and will house the probation officers and clerical staff.

Architects Harold E. Johnson, Lindsey and Lindsey were instructed by the Board to proceed with the preparation of final plans for the building.
