Still racing in hard luck, Torrance pilot Parnelli Jones lived up to expectations Memorial Day in the Indianapolis 500, leading for 120 laps, but dropped back to seventh when his brakes went out.

Despite his ill fortune, Jones, the Speedway Co-Rookie of the year in 1961 with a twelfth-place finish, managed to pick up \$33,516 for his efforts.

The lion's share of the loot came from his 120 laps as leader of the famed brickyard, but more money was added from his seventh place finish and his winning of the pole position with a new Indianapolis record.

JONES' BRAKES disappeared on the 76th lap, yet the gutsy driver continued to roll on in the lead for another 50 laps, piling up another \$150 each time he led the pack around the 2½-mile course.

Rodger Ward, setting a new standard in the process and landing a pot of \$124,515 for his efforts, took his second Memorial Day win in four years, edging out teammate Len Sutton by a bare 12 seconds.

J. C. AGAJANIAN, owner of the Jones-driven bomb, predicted the Torrance pilot would win next year.

"Parnelli set a course record of 148-plus m.p.h. in the race without punishing the car, and without brakes, he got laps of 146 and 147 m.p.h. in light traffic," Agajanian happily remarked.

THE PROBLEM in the Agajanian Willard Battery Special was a leak in the brake line. Everytime Jones applied the brakes there was a puff of smoke as fluid leaked on the exhaust. His pit crew, at first, feared engine trouble because of the smoke.
