

Garden Checklist

1. Sprinkle the leaves of Fuchsias, Begonias, Camellias and other such moisture loving shade plants when you water them. In extremely hot areas, this should be done each day.
2. The foliage of spring-blooming bulbs should be dried off by this time. It should be cut back, if such is the case.
3. Dahlias are gross feeders and will benefit by frequent helpings of fertilizer.
4. If you grow blackberries, cut off the old canes that bore this year's crop and loosely twine the new growth onto the trellis.
5. Shade newly planted annuals from the hot sun for a day or so.

Camino Presents Children's Play

Turning from heavy drama to children's theater for their second production of the summer season, El Camino College drama students will present "Once Upon a Clothesline" at 7:30 Friday night in the Campus Theater.

Three performances of Auran Harris' prize-winning play will be given Saturday; curtain times will be 10:30 a.m., 2:30 p.m., and 7:30 p.m. All seats are currently available in the college book store for 75 cents. Tickets will be sold at the door previous to each performance.

"Once Upon a Clothesline" is the second of the summer series of three plays staged under the general direction of instructor Howard M. Banks. Applauded for their convincing performances in the initial play last weekend, Max Huber and Hal Bokar led a cast of 18 men in a dramatic portrayal of Herman Wouk's "Caine Mutiny Court Martial."

The third production, scheduled for July 27 and 28, will feature "Tea House of the August Moon." Tickets for this production are now being reserved in the student store at \$1 each.

"Once Upon a Clothesline" will be under the direction of drama student David Pritchard, assisted by Laura Lee Lavelle. The story centers upon a boy and girl clothespin, Pinno and Pinnette. During a storm Pinnette topples from a clothesline, falling into the lair of Mrs. Spider. Pinno comes to his friend's aid and with assistance of other characters in the cast.

Preparations for Pinnette's rescue from Mrs. Spider are hilarious, and the actual accomplishment of the rescue makes for an exciting and imaginative theater experience," Banks comments.

Taking the role of Pinnette will be Susan Michael, who received the El Camino Thespian Award for the Best Actress of 1961-62. She has appeared in the Campus Theater previously in "The Madwoman of Chaillot," "Cinderella," and in one-act productions.

Brian McKernan, who appeared in the ECC production of "Cinderella" with Miss Michaels, appears with her in the leading role of Pinno. He is an accomplished figure skater, having won the Arizona State Junior Men's championship in 1959-60. He appeared in the 1958-59 Ice Revue of the Skating Club in Phoenix. Playing the parts of two birds are Dove Lansburg, in her first El Camino appearance, and Ann Estrin, a graduate of Leuzinger High School,

who played in three ECC summer plays last year.

THE VILLIANOUS Mrs. Spider is played by Corinne Williams. Other roles are taken by Mary Gillam, Mrs. Ant; Dennis Parker, Mr. Cricket; Tony Puckett, Mr. Grasshopper; Paul Wilkening, Dr. Beetle; Adelaide Evans, Junior Ant, and Pat Roney, Joy Hewitt and Barbara Galennie as the grasshoppers.

Costumes for the production were designed and executed by Tesse Tinker, assisted by Louise Winkler. Bob Crutchfield has contrived a colorful sound track to provide musical accompaniment for the play.
