Unit At Camp for 2 Weeks

Fifty Torrance citizen soldiers currently on two weeks of active duty training with the 3rd Battle Group, 27th Infantry Regiment of the 63rd Infantry Division at Camp Roberts, are participating this week in marathon day-and-night training tests to determine the combat efficiency of the Army Reserve Division's foot-soldier platoons.

The local reservists are in the second week of their 15 days of annual summer camp training. The 3rd Battle Group, 27th Infantry "Wolfhounds" is one

of the five battle groups of the 63rd Division, the west's largest Army Reserve unit. The 63rd has 6,000 men at Summer Camp this year at four locations — Camp Roberts, Fort Irwin, Hunter Liggett Military Reservation and Fort Lewis.

THE CITIZEN soldiers of the reserve division last week underwent five days of rugged field firing and maneuvers. This week they began the Army's platoon combat testing. The results will indicate the readiness of 63rd personnel to

meet any emergency call to the nation's defense.

Senator Engle Flays 'Depressed' Tactics

Senator Clair Engle (D-Calif.) has sharply criticized the government policy of labeling an area "depressed" without approval of local elected officials.

In a letter to Luther H. Hodges, Secretary of Commerce, Senator Engle declared:

"We did not set up the ARA (Area Redevelopment Administration) in your Department to force redevelopment medi-

cine down the throats of areas that don't know they are depressed, that haven't applied for this Federal assistance, and don't want it.

"Yet this has happened in California. I should like to ask why?"

"I supported the Area Redevelopment Act. It has been beneficial in alleviating economic depression in many areas. I hope overzealous bureaucracy will not spoil it."

SENATOR ENGLE quoted from a much-publicized editorial in the Trinity County Journal of Weaverville, Calif., entitled, "Lie Down and Be Depressed, Damn You."

Senator Engle said California officials have charged that unemployment figures are often "statistical—that the government figures include housewives back in the home after seasonal work in a cannery, teenagers back in school after vacation employment, and construction workers who periodically move on to other jobs in other Counties and States."

"I BELIEVE, Mr. Secretary, that the involuntary declaration of counties as redevelopment areas without their knowledge, request, approval, or desire is wrong.

"I believe when economic surveys or unemployment data warrant, that a County can be advised of the possible benefits of the ARA—and that the next move should be up to the County.

"What one county does in this respect does not affect another. Irrespective of federal statistics, applicants for federal assistance of this nature should be voluntary."
