THE NEW police facility, one of the most modern in the area, is located at 2175

Wilmington-San Pedro Rd. It replaces the old station, located at 638 S. Beacon St., San Pedro.

Plans for the ceremonies are being formulated by the Board of Public Works and Councilman John S. Gibson Jr. Mayor Samuel Yorty will deliver the dedication address.

Donald C. Tillman, president of the Board of Public Works, will serve as master of ceremonies for the afternoon.

THE TWO-STORY facility was designed by architects Samuel E. Lunden and Associ-

ates, and Andrew Joncich and William Lusby. It was built by Wagner and Fremer under contracts from the Board of Public Works.

The new station consists of a complex of structures. Facilities are provided for juvenile department headquarters, ra-

dio equipment, and detention areas. Interrogation rooms and offices are also included in the T-shaped building. Glass replaces the conventional steel bars in the detention areas.

Ceremonies are open to the public. Prominent civic leaders from the area will participate.

New Contract Awarded for Reflectors

Continued large-scale production of aircraft radar reflectors at Ryan Aeronautical Co. explosive forming facilities was assured last week with the award of a new contract for \$250,000 by the Dalmo Victor Co.

Nearly 2,000 aluminum reflectors, which are installed in the nose of military aircraft as part of the radar equipment, have been built at the Ryan facilities since it began operation near San Diego in 1960.

The new orders from Dalmo are the largest series of orders yet received by the Ryan firm.

A large part of the reflector order is destined for aircraft being built in the Netherlands for NATO defenses. U.S. and Canadian military planes will use the remainder.
