Los Angeles Tax Rate At \$3.80 for Schools

A final city schools operating budget of \$294,138,567 for 1962-63 was approved last week by the Los Angeles City Board of Education after nearly eight months of deliberations and public meetings.

This general purpose fund budget is \$18,266,227 over the comparable document for 1961-62 and now will be filed with the County Superintendent of Schools and then with the County Board of Supervisors.

An estimated over-all tax rate of \$3.8013 will be required to finance the general funds operating budget and an additional \$45,462,962 in special funds and also the interest and bond redemptions of the school system's building program, Superintendent Jack P. Crowther informed the Board of Education. The estimated rate is approximately two cents less than last year's total tax rate of \$3.8225 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

THE superintendent stated that although there is a reduction in the over-all estimated tax needs, the unified district's tax rate, which provides funds for operating the system's elementary, junior and senior high schools, is at the minimum statutory limit of \$2.65.

The slight reduction in the over-all rate, Crowther said, results from reduced tax needs for the district retirement system caused by additional income from the retirement system's investments.

Superintendent Crowther stated that the required tax rate will be set by the County Board of Supervisors on or before Sept. 1 after final assessed valuations are available. He said that although this is the school system's final budget, the tax rate is still on an estimated basis. Crowther likewise pointed out that the bond interest and redemption funds are established by the County and not by the school system.

IN ORDER to keep within the present tax rate ceiling, Crowther said, "it was impossible to expand the current educational program except to provide for growth and enrollment.

"In addition it has necessitated curtailment or elimination of such programs and services as reserve teachers for remedial reading and gifted pupils, elementary foreign language program, interior painting of buildings, radio and instructional television programs, specialized health services, and additional supervisory and consultant time.

"It was also necessary to modify the policy in regard to the boundaries for which pupils can be transported to schools and to reduce the number of kindergarten classes due to lack of classroom facilities, as well as funds for salaries."

IN ORDER to keep within the tax ceiling limitation in view of the defeat of Proposition C on June 5, the school system has increased pupil transportation boundaries one-quarter mile. Hereafter only students living more than 2 1/2 miles from elementary school, 2 3/4 miles from junior high schools and 3 1/4 miles from senior high schools will be given free transportation.

In another economy move the schools lopped off 75 kindergarten teachers, which is equivalent to 150 classes. It is expected that more than 4,000 children will now be put on waiting lists for the coming semester.

Superintendent Crowther explained that the general purpose fund final budget provides for an estimated 25,000 increase in pupil growth in September 1962, as compared

to September 1961. It also provides for the opening of 15 new schools next year — six in September and nine in February. Nine of the new plants are elementary schools, four are junior high schools and two are senior high schools.

THE BUDGET adopted calls

for salary increases for certificated and classified employees — \$7,139,147; progressive and point salary increments for employees — \$5,761,434; additional principals, vice principals, counselors and teachers to provide for new schools and growth — \$1,127,713.

Additional school clerks, instructional supplies, books and other instructional expenses to provide for growth — \$855,559; maintenance and operation of plants due to new schools opening during the year — \$2,664,313; tuition contracts with outside districts — \$960,762; expenses for Board members' elections, reserves, bond and tax elections, and fixed charges — \$1,487,020.

The legal maximum tax rate is \$2.6500 for the unified district (elementary, junior and senior high schools) and \$0.35 for the junior college district. Nothing remains in the unified district and approximately 11 cents remain in the junior college district.
