

New Teachers Join ECC Faculty for Fall Term

Two new teachers of psychology are among a group of 20 newcomers to the faculty for El Camino College who will greet a banner enrollment on the first day of classes, Sept. 11.

The two are Martin G. Keillor of Los Angeles and Richard W. Dickinson of Long Beach. Both will be a part of the division of social sciences, headed by John A. de la Haye.

Dickinson comes to the faculty as a full-time instructor, following work as a student teacher at El Camino during the past semester. He is experienced in the field of testing, having been employed by the Bellflower School District and by Long Beach State College.

A graduate of Polytechnic High School in Long Beach, the new instructor attended Long Beach City College, where he secured his associate in arts degree, and Long

Beach State College, from which he received both the bachelor and master's degree of art in the field of psychology.

KEILLOR is a graduate of Pepperdine College and the University of Southern California. A candidate for the Ph.D., he secured both the bachelor and master's degrees at Pepperdine.

A student teacher in psychology at El Camino under the direction of the late Dr. Lyle Tussing, Keillor was employed during the past year in the Long Beach school system.

He has served as youth director of the Crenshaw Christian Church in Inglewood, as guidance consultant for the California School for Child Training, and as a probation counselor for the Los Angeles County Probation Department.

DDD Service Cut-Over Is Slated Soon

Direct distance dialing, DDD, which enables telephone subscribers to dial long distance numbers without the assistance of an operator, is slated to be installed in 38 General Telephone areas in the next two years.

Central offices in Whittier, Pico-Rivera, and La Habra are slated to cut DDD service in this year.

The General Telephone service area covering western Torrance, Redondo, Palos Verdes, El Nido, and Rolling Hills will cut DDD into service sometime during 1964.

Bernard LeBaron, Palos Verdes district manager, said that customers would be notified of the cut-over, and would receive dialing instructions at that time.

Said certified check or bidder's bond will be forfeited should the successful bidder fail to enter into a Contract to do the work herein specified and to furnish the necessary bonds within twenty-five (25) days after the date of the award of the Contract.

The successful bidder shall at the time of signing the Contract furnish bonds of a surety company or companies authorized to do business

IN THE State of California, and satisfactory to the City Engineer of the City of Torrance, and made payable to the City of Torrance, as follows:

(1) A bond in an amount equal to fifty percent of the Contractor's bid, for the payment of just claims for materials, labor, and subcontractors employed by him thereon, and

(2) A bond in an amount equal to fifty percent of the Contractor's bid as surety for the faithful performance of the Contract and for the fulfillment of such other requirements as may be provided by law.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 1779 of the Labor Code of the State of California, the City Council has ascertained the general prevailing rate of per diem wages in the locality in which the work is to be done for each craft or type of workman needed in the execution of this Contract.

Foremen, except as otherwise separately classified, shall be paid not less than \$2.00 per day more than the journeyman rate for the craft involved.

Provided that not less than one day of each eight (8) hours prevailing rate shall be paid for any working time more than eight (8) hours during any calendar day, and for time on Saturdays, Sundays, and the seven legal holidays, to wit: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

Provided that notwithstanding the general provisions contained herein, Firemen, Guards, and Watchmen shall be paid one and one-half times the prevailing rate for time worked in excess of eight (8) hours per day or for the sixth consecutive day worked for holidays except when the holiday falls on the seventh consecutive day worked which shall be two (2) times the prevailing rate, and two (2) times the prevailing rate for the seventh consecutive day worked for time worked on Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays where such time does not constitute overtime.

The foregoing prevailing wage schedule is based upon a working day of eight (8) hours and in the event that laborers, workmen, or mechanics are employed less than eight (8) hours per day, the per diem wages shall be deemed to be that fraction of the foregoing rates that the number of hours of employment bears to eight.

The rate of compensation for any classification not listed in the schedule, but which may be required to execute the proposed Contract, shall be commensurate and in accord with the rates specified for similar and comparable classifications or for those performing similar or comparable duties.

It is mandatory upon the Contractor to whom a Contract is awarded, and upon all Subcontractors under him, to pay not less than said general prevailing rates of per diem wages to all workmen employed in the execution of the Contract.

The time within which the aforementioned work must be completed by the Contractor undertaking the same has been fixed at fifteen (15) working days from and after the date of the execution of the contract agreement.

All bids will be compared on basis of the City Engineer's estimate of the quantities of the work to be done. In case of discrepancy between words and figures, the words shall prevail. Any errors in extension or additions shall be corrected and the total bid price shall be adjusted in accordance therewith. Any alteration of, or addition to the form of the proposal which qualifies the bid will invalidate same.

All bidders must be licensed in accordance with the provisions of Business and Professions Code, as amended.

The City Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids or waive any informality, technical error, or discrepancy on a bid if said action is deemed to be advantageous to the City.

Plans, specifications and proposal forms may be obtained from the Office of the City Engineer, City Hall, 3031 Torrance Blvd., Torrance, California, upon deposit of Five Dollars (\$5.00) which is refundable upon return of receipt therefor, together with plans and specifications in good condition, within ten days after bid opening.

ORDINANCE NO. 1331
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, AUTHORIZING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY NEEDED TO MEET THE TOTAL ESTABLISHED EXPENDITURES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1962-63 LESS THE AMOUNTS RAISED BY REVENUES COLLECTED OR TRANSFERRED FROM SOURCES OTHER THAN GENERAL PROPERTY TAXES.

WHEREAS, on June 28, 1962, the City Council of the City of Torrance did pass Resolution 82-123 adopting the annual budget for the fiscal year 1962-63 and appropriating therefor the sum of \$8,420,960;

WHEREAS, the amounts raised by revenues collected or transferred from sources other than general property taxes on secured real and personal property total \$5,830,221;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Torrance do hereby ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That the amount of money necessary to be raised by taxation on the taxable property of the City of Torrance for general municipal purposes; for library purposes; to pay the interest bonded on the State Employees' Retirement System; for the payment of principal or interest bonded on other indebtedness of the City; and for parks, playgrounds and recreational centers purposes, hereby fixed and determined in the following manner:

A. For general municipal purposes, the sum of \$2,038,038.

B. For library purposes, the sum of \$155,992.

C. To pay the obligations of the City to the State Employees' Retirement System, the sum of \$884,328.

D. For payment of principal and interest maturing on Municipal Improvement Bonds, Series 1954, the sum of \$20,347.

E. For payment of principal and interest maturing on Municipal Improvement Bonds, Series 1955, the sum of \$20,347.

F. For parks, playgrounds and recreational centers purposes, the sum of \$146,949.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption for the reason that the ordinance determining the amount of money necessary to be raised by taxation in the City of Torrance for the fiscal year 1962-63 must be filed with the County Auditor not later than August 30, 1962; and by reason of the provisions of Article IX, Section 14 of the City Charter relating to ordinances determining the amount of money necessary to be raised by taxation.

SECTION 3. That the Mayor and City Clerk shall execute and attest to the adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper printed, published and circulated in the City of Torrance.
