

# Red 'Front' Operators Listed by House Group

 Please obtain, if you can, a copy of a document titled, "Western Section of the Southern California District of the Community Party — Hearings Before the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives," of the 86th Congress, First Session, Oct. 20, 1959, Part 1, printed for the use of the Committee on Un-American Activities (United States Government Printing

Office, Washington 25, D.C., 1960).  
 This publication is very difficult to obtain because the communists and their "front" organizations have obtained as many copies as they could to take the document out of circulation. It is doubtful if you can obtain a copy from the U. S. Government Printing Office.  
 Your best opportunity to obtain a copy is to write to a U. S. Senator, or a Member of

the U. S. House of Representatives. In the area covered by this newspaper you may get results by writing to any or all of the following: U. S. Senator Thomas H. Kuchel and U. S. Senator Clair Engle, both at Senate Office Building, Washington 25, D.C.; Alphonzo E. Bell Jr., Cecil R. King, Craig Hosmer, and James Roosevelt, all of whom should be addressed as "Congressman" and at the House Office Building, Washington 25, D.C.

While you are waiting to obtain a copy of this very interesting public document from a U.S. Senator or a Member of Congress, personally contact the Los Angeles City Library or any of its branches, and ask if they have a copy of the document on hand, or if they can get it soon. It is probable that they will not let you take it out but will let you read it at either the Central Library, 630 W. 5th St., Los Angeles, or at one of the many branches

listed in the Central Section of the telephone directory.  
 If you fail to get access to the document through the Los Angeles City Library, or if they express the need for delay, then try the Los Angeles County Library 342 S. Broadway, Los Angeles, or any of its branches listed in various telephone books.  
 WHEN YOU read the document you will find the names of people who were cited as

members of the communist party, or one of its "front" organizations, identified as such as of Oct. 20, 1959. You will also find the names of people who plead the Fifth Amendment to avoid giving testimony about their activities as members or friends of the communist party in California.  
 Furthermore, you can find these people in the telephone books, and if you have read news releases in various newspapers published in the South

Bay and San Pedro Harbor area, you will find that these same people are active politically. Some are officers of official political clubs, some are members of such clubs, and some are active in campaigning for the election of candidates who are "soft on communism." Notice that I have not said that such people are presently communists or affiliated with communist-front organizations, because that might be difficult to prove.

## South High Student on Atom Panel

Richard R. Coulter of South High School has been nominated as a candidate for a delegate's seat at the fourth annual National Youth Conference on the Atom, to be held in Chicago in November.  
 Outstanding high school science students throughout Southern California Edison Co.'s service territory in southern and central California are being nominated for the seats. Six students and their science teachers will be sent to the conference, all expenses paid, by the electric company, according to L. L. Jenkins, Edison's Redondo Beach district manager.  
 To be held from Nov. 8 through 10, delegates will be given the opportunity to hear and meet many of the nation's leading scientists in the nuclear field. They will also be invited to tour the Argonne National Laboratories and the Dresden nuclear powered electric generating station near Chicago.

## Youths Open Drive for Nixon Votes

Enlistments in the Southern California Youth for Nixon corps of campaigners hit the 1,650 mark this week.  
 Larry Gould Jr., 16, who resides in San Gabriel Valley has been named chairman of the youth group. He said the initial 1,650 will serve as recruiters to enroll thousands more to work for Richard M. Nixon in his bid for the governorship of California.  
 "The master plan is to have a Youth for Nixon Club in each city in Southern California," he said. He reported 35 clubs have already been chartered. "This is a great way for young people to get practical experience in political and civic affairs."

Chief activity, he said, will be to conduct "bumper blitzes" to put Nixon for Governor stickers on as many automobiles as possible. Owners will be asked for permission by youth groups at shopping centers and other places of car concentration.  
 Automobile motorcades in decorated cars carrying Nixonettes and other rooters for Nixon are planned for every part of the Southland.  
 Gould is senior at San Marino High School and vice president of his class. Any high school student is eligible to join Youth for Nixon, he said. Applicants should write him at Post Office Box 262, Alhambra.

## Drivers for Blind Needed In Torrance

Adults with cars who live in Torrance and who are willing to volunteer a few hours of time to drive blind children in to Los Angeles for special classes are needed urgently by the Foundation for the Junior Blind, according to Norman Kaplan, executive director of the non-profit organization.  
 "Each Friday and Saturday we need drivers to pick up sightless youngsters at their homes and bring them in to the Foundation for classes or parties, or for nature trips or just plain fun excursions," Kaplan said.  
 "There are several blind children in Torrance who are anxious to use the special facilities of the Foundation who will not be able to do so unless we can locate volunteers who are willing to drive," he added.  
 Kaplan pointed out that even one trip now and then would be of great help.
