El Camino Instructor To Use European Ideas

"Ten years ago European women were far behind the times in fashion, now they are our equals," Mrs. Marisa Robles, El Camino College clothing instructor, concluded after her three months tour of Italy, Spain, Austria and Germany.

Mrs. Robles, power sewing and pattern making teacher at El Camino, viewed the latest fashion trends while visiting Rome for a family reunion.

"Styles seem to be a step ahead in Europe," Mrs. Robles added. "For instance, ten years ago pointed shoes came into fashion. Now the square toe is already popular."

Lack of mass production has made it necessary for European women to employ dressmakers. Small shops that sell custom-made fashions are widely patronized.

Rather than buy many dresses, the European woman prefers to purchase only one or two a year.

Window displays in Rome do not make use of props or mannikins. The clothes are suspended by nylon threads and appear to be hanging in midair.

"Women in Europe do not neglect the beach as a place to show their finery," Mrs. Robles commented. "The European woman would not think of going to the beach without two, three, or even four complete changes," she pointed out.

"Cabanas are rented to provide a place to change from bathing suit to sun dress, and then perhaps back to a different bathing suit," the instructor commented.

Mrs. Robles, whose career in the fashion industry led to teaching at El Camino College, plans to use new European fashion ideas in phases of the class work at El Camino.

"It will serve as an influence and an aid to general teaching, but we do not intend to change the value and importance of what is already established in our classes," she concluded.
