## North, Cougars Eye Loop Title, CIF Bid

History seldom has a chance of repeating itself, but it may happen tomorrow night—only this time in reverse.

Slightly more than a year ago, North High beat Hawthorne. The loss cost the Cougars a tie for the Bay League title and a bid to the CIF.

Victory for North meant a second place finish and bid to the playoffs.

**HISTORY**, in reverse, could happen tomorrow.

North leads the Bay League with Redondo and Hawthorne only one-half game behind. Hawthorne has pointed for the contest all year. The game takes on special significance now.

**THIS TIME** the shoe is on the other foot. A loss will cost the Saxons a bid to the CIF and the loop championship, putting them in third place instead of first. Hawthorne can take the circuit crown with a victory and earn a playoff invitation in the process.

Game time will be 8 p.m. on the North gridiron with an overflow crowd expected to witness the event.

**THE CONTEST** could turn

into a fight between a good passing club and a powerful running team.

With four strong running backs in the fold, North has gained over 300 yards on the ground in both of its last two encounters.

**LAST WEEK**, in the Saxon's 47 victory over Leuzinger, fullback Doug Ball hauled the pigskin 112 yards in 11 tries. Carey Hubert carried 17 times for 101 yards, most of the distance coming on crucial situations.

Slotback Darryl Wilson picked up 36 yards in 10 attempts while Norm Dow, quarterback, carried 14 times for 72 yards.

**WITH SENIOR** quarterback Bill Daquila at the helm, Haw-

thorne takes advantage of the air lanes, preferring to strike quickly rather than grind out the yardage as North prefers.

However, the Cougars have the potential to pick up but three and four yards at a crack with an all-letterman backfield.

**NORTH CAN** steal the Hawthorne passing thunder. Against Morningside, Dow hit on six of six aerials for two touchdowns in his finest passing show of the year.

An interested spectator as far as the final outcome of the tilt will be Redondo, with a possible league title and CIF bid also hanging on the outcome. The Seahawks take on a weak Morningside eleven tomorrow.

**THE MUSTANGS'** main claim to fame is a 7-6 upset win over second place Redondo. The Mira Costa strength is South's weakness—the line.

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Two teams of contrasting natures will meet in a Marine League fray tomorrow at 8 p.m. on the Gardena High gridiron.

Gardena will be angling for a league title tie. Narbonne will be looking for its initial victory of the season.

San Pedro already has a share of the Marine title with a 3-1 record. Banning and Gardena, with games tomorrow, have 2-1 marks.

Narbonne is 0-4 for the circuit schedule, and has not won a contest all season. Nor do the Gauchos figure to win tomorrow night.

**GARDENA IS** sparked by a brother tandem of quarterback Don Horn throwing to his brother Steve Twice this year the brothers have teamed to bring Gardena from the brink of defeat on the final play of the contest.

Defending the Mohicans will be a Narbonne secondary which held Jordan's vaunted aerial circus in check for three quarters, before falling apart in the final stanza and allowing three scores.

## Upset-Minded Montgomery After Initial Loop Victory

Only one more opportunity remains for Bishop Montgomery to capture a Camino Real League football victory in the 1962 season.

Tomorrow at 8 p.m., the Knights take on St. Bernard on the Montgomery field in the final official contest of the year for both elevens.

Winless in league play, and with only an upset 7-0 victory over Mount Carmel to its credit, Montgomery will find rough going against the invaders.

**IF ST. BERNARD** wins, it could conceivably wind up in a five-way tie for second place

in the tightly packed Camino Real loop. Defeat would leave BMHS with a 0-6-0 mark against circuit opposition.

As indicated by only 66 points scored against it, St. Bernard will not be run over. However, the visitors have tallied only 50 points themselves.

**MONTGOMERY** has given up 126 points and placed but 26 on the scoreboard. In the last two games, the Knights have been on the upswing, dropping a 9-6 nod to Vianney and a 6-0 decision to St. Monica.

BMHS coach George Swade

describes St. Bernard as, "A tough defensive team." With the number one Knight quarterback out for the year because of an injury, fullback Dick Carbajal remains the main BMHS offensive threat.

Substitute signal-caller Steve Fox can throw to a top end in John Joseph to balance Carbajal's ground thrusts.

St. Bernard has a 2-3 league record, but still could tie for second. Fermin Lasuen leads the loop with a 5-0 mark, followed by St. John Vianney, 3-2; St. Monica, 3-2; Crespi, 3-3, and Alemany, 2-3.

## Tribe Eleven Ends Season

With a possible third place finish in the Metropolitan Conference hanging in the balance, El Camino ends its football season at 8 p.m. Saturday at Cerritos.

Currently, Santa Monica and El Camino are tied for third place with 4-2 records. Long Beach leads the pack with a 5-0-1 mark with Bakersfield second at 4-1-1.

However, Long Beach is expected to roll over Santa Monica on Saturday, and should ECC whip Cerritos, it would leave the Warriors encamped in third place.

**BECAUSE OF** past performances, the Falcons must be given the nod over Camino. Cerritos whipped Bakersfield and fell only 8-0 to Long Beach.

ECC was not as fortunate, as both of the two top teams handily rolled over the Tribe.

**COMPARATIVE** scores also show that Santa Monica whipped Cerritos, but fell 21-18 on Saturday to the Redskins.

It was not until the final four minutes that El Camino

was able to overcome Santa Monica and take the win. Even then, the Tribe had to hold off a final SMCC victory-bid which died on the ECC six.

**QUARTERBACK** John Torok led the Warrior comeback, throwing for three touchdowns. Torok hit former North High end Pae Llinger on scoring strikes of 30 and 48 yards. The other EC touchdown came on a 21-yard pitch from Torok to Jim Allison.

**CLIMAXING** a long drive, Reynolds popped through center of the line from two yards out to account for the second Charger tally. Ron Stone boomed off left tackle for the conversion.

Torrance coaches named John Futrell as outstanding lineman of the contest for his efforts at middle guard.

**ENCOUNTERING** surprisingly stiff opposition from the Hawthorne Scorpions, the Torrance Vikings finally pulled out a 7-0 Peewee Division win.

John Cook ripped through the middle of the line for 28 yards, only to be pulled down on the one-foot line. Cook then plunged over for the touchdown and repeated his performance for the extra point.

**STEVE MITCHELL**, Brad Rucker, and Pat Coons were outstanding on defense for the Vikings.

Halted by two superb goal-

line stands, the Torrance Oilers dropped a 6-0 Peewee Division game to the Gardena Stars. Bill Buxton starred for Torrance on defense with two intercepted passes.

**GREG VEACH** galloped for two long runs for the Oilers, but the losers could not win over the TD. The contest was non-league and does not affect the Oilers' tie for first place in the South Bay Conference.

In another Division Pop Warner clash, the Redon's Adonians whipped the Torrance Mustangs, 16-6. Pat Fromm scored 32 yards for the lone Mustang score. Lee Hill was voted the top Torrance defensive player.

Many of the players on the newly-formed clubs have been


imported from Canada.
