Unitarian Minister To Speak on 'Survival'

Rev. Brooks R. Walker, minister of the Emerson Unitarian Church in Conoga Park, will speak Dec. 7 at Aviation High School on "Conformity and Individual Survival."

The speaker, although prominent through his frequent magazine contributions and numerous radio and television appearances, gained his widest publicity earlier this year unwillingly.

The Unitarian minister was one of two clergymen whose homes were bombed while they were speaking at a program on what was called the right wing extremist movement in this country.

His appearance at the Redondo Beach school is being sponsored by the Pacific Unitarian Church at its third annual Harry A. Shuder Memorial Address. The address honors the volunteer minister who helped found the church seven years ago.

Safety Rules To Assist Fog Drivers

With one of winter's most treacherous driving hazards—fog—now confronting motorists almost daily in many areas of California, Highway Patrol Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden offered several tips on fog driving.

"Always use the low headlight beam. The high beam reflects off water droplets and can blind you. Never use parking lights; they not only are ineffective but are illegal to use as driving lights. Even if visibility appears adequate without headlights, turn them on. It will help the other driver see you.

"Increase your following distance. A sudden slowdown ahead then won't find you short of room to stop.

"Decrease your speed. You won't be overdriving your visibility range.

"Be alert for side traffic. A car entering from a side road is not readily apparent," the commissioner concluded.

Law in Action

The "writ of habeas corpus" is a quick and useful way to challenge the government's illegal restraint on a person. It demands "by what right" is the government holding him?

The writ has challenged unlawful arrests, false imprisonments, or denials of reasonable bail. If successful in his proceeding, the person goes free.

ONE CAN use habeas corpus also in civil proceedings. A person may have been unlawfully jailed for not paying alimony. He may have been kept in a hospital illegally or against his wishes. Habeas corpus may be brought in to get a speedy hearing on restraining a person's liberty.

A prisoner loses most of his civil rights. Still under the constitution he cannot be made to suffer cruel and unusual punishment as when a person claims that guards beat him without justification.

WHAT ARE some of his rights? A prisoner can engage in religious activities. He can communicate with his lawyer.

He has access to the courts, to present petitions and appeals.

Because such claims raise constitutional questions, persons may take their writs to the federal court if they are not satisfied with what the state courts do.

As you might expect most such petitions have no merit. Yet, because the rights are protected by the writ of habeas corpus the courts always give them careful scrutiny.

"This five-room house exemplifies the best in home building techniques and skills with every feature, from foundation to finish hardware," Elmgren said.

The house is ready to put on the foundation. It has oak hardwood and vinyl tiled floors, redwood siding exterior, dry wall interior, wide, closed overhang and a shingle roof.

OTHER FEATURES are fixed and louvered sashed glass windows, ventilating hood and fan for the kitchen range and self edged formica kitchen counter tops, and numerous kitchen cabinets. The ceramic tile bath has a shower over the tub and pullman cabinets. There are also modern slab doors throughout the house.

Plumbing and lighting fixtures are installed and ready for hook-up to service and the house is electrically wired in flexible conduit.

"QUALITY OF the house is excellent because of particular care and extra inspection," Elmgren commented.

Kenneth Dutro, carpentry instructor who supervised the house construction, stated that the house was built so that it can be easily and safely moved.
