(Continued from Page 1) range of structural steel products for the western construction industry has been available from Torrance since late October.

Continued growth and integration of Harvey Aluminum was predicted in a year end statement issued here by President Lawrence A. Harvey. He pointed to the construction started recently on a large alumina plant in the Virgin Islands, and recently concluded agreement to obtain bauxite ore in the Caribbean area.

"We also begin negotiating for additional mining reserves in other parts of the world," Harvey said.

LOOKING OVER 1962 just completed, the Harvey executive reported, a comprehensive pension retirement program covering all hourly employees, production, service, and office workers was put into effect and is paid for by the company.

President Harvey pointed out that the firm paid out \$2,100,000 in dividends, and that investments in fixed capital expenditures for expansion and modernization amounted to \$9,550,000. At the same time, the company reduced its long-term indebtedness by more than \$7 million.
