Youth Groups Deliver Brochures to Homes

An intensive educational program, planned to inform every citizen of the Carson area of county public library services available in the community, began last week under the auspices of John D. Calas, educational program chairman of the Carson Chamber of Commerce and Art Reeves, chamber president.

Calas, who represents the Carson Public Library as a member of the Region III Advisory Council, said that he felt that all citizens of Carson should know what library services are available to them.

"County library service is one of the best bargains that a citizen can obtain from government and I believe that each person should take advantage of all the vast resources of books, magazines, and other material available at the library," he declared.

HE CONCEIVED the idea of preparing a concise, informative booklet, listing the location of the three Carson area libraries and detailing services and facilities available.

"An initial order of 5,000 brochures were distributed by the Boy Scouts, Little Leaguers and members of other community youth groups," Calas con-

tinued. He added that the pamphlets were delivered to each home so that each family will have the information readily available.

If additional brochures are needed they will be provided, he said. The leaflets were distributed to each home in the area bounded by Artesia Boulevard, Lomita Boulevard, Normandie Avenue and Wilmington Avenue.

INFORMED OF Calas' plan to distribute the educational material, County Librarian John D. Henderson declared "this is one of the finest, most constructive informational programs ever undertaken by private citizens on behalf of the county library system. I am particularly pleased that the youth groups of the community are going to participate since the county library is most anxious that our children receive maximum benefits of library service."
