

Pastor Plans To Discuss People Alone

The Rev. Dr. Russell E. Clay, pastor of First Methodist Church, Downey, will be the speaker marking the opening session of the annual School of Missions at Harbor City-Lomita Methodist Church, 25904 Cayuga Ave., Lomita, on Sunday evening.

The Rev. Dr. Clay was a member of the Sherwood-Eddy Seminar to Europe in 1953; leader of the Methodist Church Seminar to Europe and the Holy Land in 1959 where he participated with outstanding leaders in government, education, social service and religion; and served as Los Angeles district superintendent of the Southern California-Arizona Methodist Church Conference in 1960.

His topic on Sunday evening "Lost in the Crowd" will emphasize special groups living in modern cities, the lonely, new-comers, senior citizens, mental and physically handicapped children and adults, and minority groups.

Under the direction of the Commission of Missions of the church with Mrs. Max Schatz, chairman, four consecutive evenings, Jan. 20, 27; Feb. 3 and 10 will be devoted to this church-wide emphasis beginning with a family pot-luck dinner at 5:30.

At 6:30, groups will be organized according to primary, junior and senior high and adult levels to develop this year's theme "The Church's Mission to Persons of Special Need."

Rev. Walberg To Discuss Mission Work

The Rev. Walberg, pastor of the Redondo Beach Congregational Church, will be the guest speaker at the Monday, 6:30 p.m. dinner, for the Men's Fellowship of the Calvary Baptist Church, 2818 Manhattan Beach Blvd.
