

# Kuchel Renews Plea to Alter Crop Program

U. S. Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel of California, the Senate Assistant Republican leader, today renewed his plea to President Kennedy for sweeping changes in the Federal price support and production control program for cotton.

With the Administration expected to send recommendations to Congress soon for new legislation, the Senior California Senator told the President a second time that California growers favor less stringent acreage limitations and lower price supports in order to meet foreign competition and resist the trend toward greater use of synthetic fibers.

"There is continuing concern in my State about the threat of demoralization to all phases of our cotton-based economy," Kuchel wrote.

The California lawmaker told the President the California producers favor a national acreage allotment of 19,000,000 acres and a basic price of 39 cents. He submitted for the President's consideration the entire program of the Western Cotton Growers Association, which included also a proposal to spend part of the savings from lower price support payments on intensified agricultural research, payment-in-kind incentives for producers who surrender their acreage allotments, an equalization fee to encourage greater domestic

# Veterans of Foreign Wars Opens 'Voice of Democracy' Contest

"What Freedom Means to Me" — this year's theme for the 16th Annual Voice of Democracy Contest — will be voiced by high school students all over California and the nation within the next few weeks.

This contest, sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars with the cooperation of the Association of Broadcasters, has been endorsed by the United States Office of Education and is on the approved list of contests of the National Association of Secondary School Principals. It is open to all 10th, 11th and 12th grade students

in all schools. The contestants write and orally deliver a 3 to 5 minutes broadcast script on the theme "What Freedom Means to Me."

SCHOOL WINNERS must be picked by Feb. 5, town winners by Feb. 12, district winners by Feb. 20, and area winners by March 1. California has been divided into six areas for fairness of judging for a state winner.

VFW State Commander H. W. Straley has announced that all six area winners will receive a 3-day trip to San Francisco,

(the VFW State Headquarters) and to Sacramento to visit the Legislature as part of the selection of the State winner, and the California state winner will go to Washington, D. C. in late March 1963 for the National winner selection. This year each state winner will go to the Freedom's Foundation in Valley Forge, Penna., en route to the Nation's Capitol.

The board authorized that sympathy certificates be mailed to the families. The elder Drale and the other two men were honored by a moment's silence at the conclusion of the board session.


# Tract Street Okay Given

Plans and specifications for construction of streets in a new housing tract in vicinity of Carson and Martin streets in the Carson-Dominguez area were approved by the Board of Supervisors.
