Cancer Drive Helper Named

Mrs. L. A. Rodson, newly appointed Section Crusade Chairman for the American Cancer Society in the West Torrance area joined other local volunteers for a briefing on the leukemia research project of Dr. Robert McAllister, associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Southern California.

The project, to study the effect of various immune sera on human leukemia cells, is being conducted under an American Cancer Society grant at Children's hospital in Los Angeles.

"More children under 15 years of age die of cancer than from any other cause," Mrs. Rodson reported.

"THESE CHILDREN are the main reason I have undertaken the job of volunteer Residential Chairman. The American Cancer Society is underwriting by far the largest amount of privately financed leukemia research in the country today, with more than \$2 million of grants in effect on this type of cancer alone."

Mrs. Rodson will be responsible for enlisting the help of more than 50 volunteers between now and the annual April Crusade.

Air Force Issues Bid to College Graduates of Area

The U.S. Air Force representative for city of Torrance announced this week that approximately 1,000 openings still exist to fill the needs of the Air Force in selection of officers in such fields as navigation, weather, aircraft maintenance, research and development management, and engineering fields of electronics. Selections are now being made for the class starting April 1, 1963.

To qualify for selection in one of the desired fields, an

applicant must be a graduate from an accredited college or university, male or female, between the ages of 20½ and 29½, and a citizen of the United States who can successfully pass a commissioning type physical. There are no restrictions as to how many dependents a male applicant may have, however, a female applicant is limited to a dependent parent only.

Upon selection into the U.S. Air Force each person applying will know their class start-

ing date and the field they have been selected for. Initial base of assignment will be Lackland AFB, Tex., where the selected officer trainee will undergo 12 weeks of Officers Training School and upon completion commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the U. S. Air Force.
