After the customers were on the floor and the tellers were crouching behind the counter, the bandit, who remained outside the counter, followed Stoneman, who was behind the counter, down the stairs of tellers. Stoneman emptied money from each drawer into the bag.

A telephone rang while the holdup was in progress. Supervisor Cathy Kruger reached up from behind a desk, picked up the telephone and whispered, "Call the police. We're being robbed!" and hung up. South Bay Credit Bureau was the caller.

After getting the bag of money from Stoneman the bandit ran out a side door and was seen getting into a car. He drove southbound on Anza and was pursued by Giles B. Figgeler of Torrance who eventually lost sight of the getaway car as it went westbound on Anita Street into Redondo Beach.

The bandit picked up McHenry's wallet and business card case, put them in his own pocket and said "If you have any money left I'm going to take a shot at you." The gunman then fled.


