Red Cross Drive Under Way

Torrance's goal in the 1963 Red Cross fund-raising drive has been set at \$8,700, according to Bob Lewellen, general fund chairman.

Various campaign leaders have been named. The first two campaigns for support of the organization's increasing community activities went into full swing on the kickoff date Saturday.

"We've been asked to raise a total of \$8,700 as this city's share in the overall Los Angeles Chapter quota of \$3,386,882... and I'm determined we can do a good job of it," Lewellen said.

KEITH H. PISCHEL, assistant vice president and manager of Pacific State Bank, will lead the commerce and industry solicitation.

"Torrance is recognized as

an outstanding industrial center," declared the local banker. "We have a goal of \$2,500, but I'm sure we will be reporting in over that figure before the campaign is very many days along."

The volunteer chairman has also worked on other group drives in this area. He and his wife, Sharon, and children, Greg and Lory, reside at 24105 Nordman in Lomita.

A WELL-KNOWN local restaurant owner, Charley Gotts, has organized the small business drive for Red Cross.

"I really feel great about this year's campaign," he said. "We all know and appreciate Red Cross services. I'm sure our business community will back us solidly."

Gotts, who has been in business in Torrance for 19 years,

has a wife, son, three daughters — and 11 grandchildren. He has asked representatives of a number of special groups within the general small business classification to make the Red Cross appeal this year.

LEWELLEN, WHO was the successful small business chairman for the 1962 Red Cross drive, is a lieutenant colonel in the National Guard Reserve and coordinator of the Torrance Armed Forces Day.

"I've lived here in Torrance since 1923. I'm proud of our all-American city. There are many more like myself who will make this our best Red Cross campaign," he declared.
