

Legislature Begins Work For 1965 Regular Session

 In today's world, legislating for an economic and governmental unit as large as California cannot well be limited on a stop-and-go basis. Our growth is never-ending, and the problems demanding action don't come in session-sized packages. That is why our interim work keeps expanding, both in volume and importance.

The Senate and the Assembly are now both preparing for their activity during the period before the 1965 regular session. The Senate has re-adopted its previous pattern of 13 fact-finding committees, 12 of which are responsible for specific subjects ranging from agriculture to water, the last for "general research." The Assembly also renewed its group of 27 interim committees, and added a new one with general responsibility.

RIGHT NOW, the Rules Committees of the two houses are deciding the expense allocations which will be given to the various committees for their needs. Based upon past experience, a total of several hundred thousand dollars will be required.

As I have written before,

these interim groups will certainly have their work cut out for them during the next 18 months. More than 500 Assembly bills, plus about 200 resolutions will be referred to the interim committees of that house for study and recommendation. About half that number will be sent to the Senate groups.

As needs require, meetings will be scheduled in many communities all over the state in months to come. Thus, many more individuals will be able

to participate directly in legislative consideration of matters in which they are concerned, than could do so if all meetings were held in Sacramento during sessions.

THE HUNDREDS of subjects to be reviewed include everything from aeronautics to water, from criminal law to workmen's compensation. Some topics will require much research, and many meetings. Others may be disposed of with less work.

As of now, it appears that four major subjects will probably attract the greatest interest during our interim activity. The problem of assuring an adequate labor supply for California's huge agricultural industry is one. Another area includes the many remaining problems in education, collegiate as well as elementary. A third relates to the social insurance programs, disability and unemployment insurance and workmen's compensation. The fourth is urban problems

The abrupt end of the program to import Mexican nationals — braceros — creates a very serious situation for the producers of some of our most important crops. If Congress persists in its refusal to extend the program, California will be confronted with the immediate necessity of developing an adequate substitute labor supply, or with practically the total loss of these crops. Greater use of youth in farm work, housing, health, social insurance — all of these involve

legislative angles which must be studied.

IN EDUCATION, the number of topics on committee agendas is large. Salary levels for college instructors, research at state colleges, a new formula for public school support, seem the most important.

Many bills relating to the benefits and financing of the social insurance programs will be on the dockets of some committees. Serious problems of
