Herald Publisher Notes Progress in Yugoslavia

(King Williams, co-publisher of the Torrance Herald, today continues his report on impressions gleaned during an extended tour of Europe and the Iron-Curtain countries. Projects promised when he visited Yugoslavia two years ago have been turned into reality, Williams found during his recent visit to the much-talked-about country.)

Whatever brand of dictatorship Tito is giving Yugoslavia it seems to be producing at least superficial signs of progress.

From the time we landed at Belgrade's new airport, one of the most modern of its size in the world, we were impressed with change. We had been in Yugoslavia in 1961 giving us an opportunity to measure progress more impressive to us than anything we had seen anywhere in central Europe.

The "new city" Yugoslav officials predicted in 1961 had materialized and formed an impressive skyline for what was then open country on the northwesterly outskirts of the metropolis. Apartment and office buildings, some reaching upward 20 stories, looked down on well laid out shopping centers and parks resembling similar developments in the United States.

There were new buildings everywhere through the old city and an army of workmen busily rebuilding and repairing others. Improved streets were congested with trucks, street cars and new automobiles, many of American make.

The Metropole hotel proved comfortable and luxurious with features geared to please the most demanding capitalist. Outside the main entrance, served by a handsome uniformed doorman, tandem street cars lumbered by, filled with neatly dressed people hurrying about their business or shopping at much improved stores in contrast

to what we had seen only two years before.

There was a holiday atmosphere about the place, made noticeable by Indonesians and Africans in native dress, awaiting a "social" visit to President Tito from Sukarno whose chartered Pan American jet landed shortly after we had arrived.


In the hotel also was a delegation of University of California professors in the country to study various phases of the national life. Included was an old friend, a former Cook County, Illinois sheriff, Professor Joseph Loman, now head of the School of Criminology at Berkeley.

For most of the next four days, life in the hotel evolved around the spectacular comings and goings of the Sukarno

party, always attended by a squadron of motorcycle police and riding in late model Cadillac and Mercedes cars.

Four of our group were invited to have breakfast with the Asian strong man in his private suite. They reported an interesting meal with the benedicta Sukarno "good natured and very vep in American ways." He was on his way home from Vienna where he had undergone medical treatment.

When the great moment of departure for Indonesia arrived, my wife "just happened to be" at the main entrance and was rewarded with a special farewell handshake from President Sukarno as Marshal Tito smilingly looked on. She still hasn't received a copy of the promised photograph of the event.

Police Show Tickets Now Being Sold



215 New Homes Approved for Peninsula Area

Two more subdivisions on the Palos Verdes Peninsula were approved this week by the Regional Planning Commission. When completed, the subdivision will add 215 homes to the Peninsula area.

Palos Verdes Properties will subdivide 90 acres of land east of Palos Verdes Drive West and south of the Palos Verdes Estates development. The firm will build 205 homes in the tract.

Torrance Student In Sweden

Victor C. Pestoff, 24429 Neece Ave., will go to Stockholm for studies this year as part of a 110-member group of California state college students taking part in the first overseas study program in the state colleges.

Pestoff, who left San Francisco Thursday, will study at universities in Sweden.

The program was inaugurated in order to afford American students maximum exposure to all aspects of life and culture in the European schools.

A member of the faculty of one of the California state colleges will act as a resident director at each of the European schools. The 11-month study period costs each student about \$1,000.

Pestoff is a student at Long Beach State College.

Interment was at Green Hills Memorial Park.


