Temple Menorah Marks Jewish High Holidays

Celebration of the Jewish High Holidays will be marked with special Rosh Hashonah and Yom Kippur services at Temple Menorah Sept. 18 and 19, and 27 and 28.

The holidays are the most important and sacred of the Jewish holidays.

Services at Temple Menorah Sept. 18 and 19 will mark the beginning of the year 5724 on the Jewish calendar. Rosh Hashonah, which means New Year, marks the calendar from the creation of the Earth.

Refunds Being Made on Gas Bills in Area, Firm Says

Local natural gas customers are currently receiving portions of \$10.8 million in refunds as credited by the Southern California Gas Co.

Coming as part of one of the largest refunds in business history, the credits are being made on current bills, according to G. M. Babbe, division manager.

Customer refunds, being made as a result of the firm's continuing efforts to maintain low gas rates, are based on amount of natural gas used during May of this year. Distribution procedure has been approved by the State Public Utilities Commission.

Babbe pointed out that all the \$10.8 million, provided by wholesaler El Paso Natural Gas Co., is being passed on to residential and industrial customers. The large sum is part of nearly \$15.5 million paid by El Paso to Southern California and Southern Counties Gas Companies which serve 2.6 million Southland residents.


