Torrance will be host to a joint meeting of the Los Angeles County Women Peace Officers Association, the Los Angeles Policewomen's Assn. and the Women Peace Officers of California on Saturday Sept. 21 at the Jump'n Jack Restaurant. Mrs. Maxine Hahn with the Torrance Police Dept. and president of the Los Angeles County Peace Officers, will serve as official hostess at the joint meeting.

This is the first time policewomen from all three agencies have met to discuss problems and projects common to all organizations, stated Mrs. Hahn.
