Delbert Vaughn Elected To State Realty Office

Election of Delbert Vaughn, past president of the Torrance-Lomita Board of Realtors, as vice president of the 21st District of the California Real Estate Assn. was announced here yesterday by Kenneth Peters, current president of the local board.

Vaughn's election came at the 59th annual convention of CREA in Los Angeles. Peters

said. As vice president of CREA President Arthur S. Leitch of San Diego, he will serve as regional head of all realty boards in the 21st District.

DURING his term as president of the Torrance-Lomita Board in 1961, the new building housing the administrative offices of the board was started and completed. Vaughn, a member of the Torrance real estate firm of Tolson and Vaughn, is presently serving as a member of the board of directors of the local realty group in addition to his new state office.

Vaughn entered the real estate business in Torrance following his release from the U. S. Navy in 1946. His community activities have included work with the March of Dimes and the Heart Fund. He was an early member and is past president of the Torrance Optimist Club and was an organizer of the first Toastmasters Club in the city.

Vaughn and his wife, Lucille, are members of the First Baptist Church of Torrance. A son, Wendell, is a sales representative for a Gardena plastics firm.

BMS Senior Gets Chance In Finals

John F. Webb, a senior at Bishop Montgomery High School, has been named as a semi-finalist in the National Merit Scholarship competition. The award places him among the top 13,000 high school seniors in the nation.

Webb, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Webb of 5312 Calle de Arboles, will be eligible to compete in the finals during the coming academic year. Top prize in the competition includes a four-year scholarship valued at \$6,000.

Semi-finalists must take the College Entrance Board examinations in December to be eligible for the finals. More than 600 companies, foundations, and private estates will present winners with scholarships for college.

The examinations are administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corp. each year in more than 16,000 high schools in the United States.

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
