The \$50,000 American Pacing Classic at a mile and one-eighth Saturday will climax some terrific battles this season between such greats as Henry T. Adios, Cold Front, Rusty Range, Irvin Paul, Stephan Smith, Midnite Hardy and others in preludes to this annual fixture, won a year ago by Irvin Paul in time that equalled Adios Butler's world record of 2:11 1/5.

As if this epic wouldn't produce enough excitement for a single afternoon, four-year-old trotters, headed by Sprite Rodney and Worth Seem, will compete in the \$20,000 guaranteed Fall Maturity Trot, a stepping stone to the \$50,000 American Trotting Classic on Saturday, Nov. 16, the closing day of the autumn meeting.

**DUKE RODNEY** won the Fall Maturity last fall, and went on to take the Classic.

Worth Seem and Sprite Rodney posted marks of 1:58 and 1:58 3/5 against the fence as three-year-olds last season, and both have won rich stakes this year.

**SPRITE RODNEY's** best win was in the \$85,663 Realization at Roosevelt Raceway, and the classy daughter of Rodney has lifetime earnings of \$224,391. At Monticello this year Worth Seem broke Su Mac Lad's mark of 2:01 4/5 over the half-mile track by one-fifth and equalled the world's mark for four-year-old mares.

The renewal of the Pacing Classic figures to be a tremendous battle of speed and wits. Henry T. Adios, whose bankroll of almost \$550,000 is the largest of any horse in training, has the early speed of the race, but he was killed off on the pace last year and finished seventh.

**IRVIN PAUL**, eighth for half the 1962 race, was a fast-finishing winner by two lengths.

Henry T. Adios, Gamecock, Mike Pick and Midnite Hardy have the early speed of this year's Classic, but waiting to pounce are such stout come-from-behinders as Cold Front, Irvin Paul, Stephan Smith and the four-year-old aces, Rusty Range and Harold J. The latter won three legs of the HTA fall pacing series, but Rusty Range took the sixth and final \$50,000 leg in 2:00 1/5 on a half-mile track.

## Porter Set To Compete In Classic

Veteran Torrance stock car driver Marvin Porter is fixed to enter the Nov. 3 Golden State 400-mile road race at Riverside International Raceway.

Signed to drive a 1963 Ford entered by Vel's Ford of Torrance, Porter will be traveling in fast company during the rich \$41,000 classic.

Entries have already been received from defending national champion Glen "Fireball" Roberts, Marvin Panch, Paul Goldsmith, Ken Miles, Roger Penske, Darel Dieringer and \$100,000 winner Freddy Lorenzen.

The "400" is expected to decide the national driving championship currently held by Weatherly. The defending titlist has a slight point lead over Richard Petty and Lorenzen.

Carrying NASCAR-FIA sanction, the "400" is the final point race of the 1963 Grand National season.

## The Fearless Spectator

We've got a pretty important lad on the agenda today in the person of Mr. John Powers, vice president of the Daisy Manufacturing Co., maker of those BB air rifles which so enriched our youth.

Mr. Powers is an evangelist. His religion is shooting. Shooting is also what pays his salary.

To get new customers Mr. Powers and the rest of the bang-bang people are now wooing children with what they call educational programs, stressing what a boon to mankind rifles and shot-guns and other firearms are.

The Daisy outfit spends "more than \$75,000 a year" on spreading the glories of shooting among boys and girls, age 7 through 14.

Starting soon, Daisy air-rifle classes and competitive teams will be sponsored for the first time by the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce to organize shooting leagues and championship matches.

Veep Powers hopes to do for shooting "what the Little Leagues did for baseball," he said the other day.

Mr. Powers is but a cog of a great promotional wheel. The gun laddies are alarmed at the apathy of the people toward their product.

The Wall Street Journal reports that since 1958 sales of sporting equipment has been going up 5 per cent each year. Guns, though, have gone up a mere 1 per cent during the same time.

"People are going outdoors for fun," says an official of the National Sporting Goods Assn. "But apparently they're not going out to shoot guns."

The fervor of the gunsmiths is so intense that they're even going after Momma's custom. The Winchester rifle people have sent inspirational literature to 20,000 women's organizations.

They're also giving away to TV stations film clips showing how to handle a gun, with "smartly dressed women" blazing away.

I wish all success to the beleaguered gunsmiths in their valorous effort to brainwash Momma and Little Willie. But I do feel there are possibly more important things to occupy the head of the house and her than shooting to kill.

The National Rifle Assn. and the rest of the gun-philies keep yammering about the sacred right of Americans to bear arms, as guaranteed in the Constitution. They don't say that this guarantee has nothing to do with shooting big or little game, but was merely an assurance that this Nation would have a "well-regulated militia."

The gun-lovers are continually talking, too, about safe gun handling, but the fact remains that guns are dangerous. Very.

As any cop can tell you, guns are just as dangerous as the man, woman, or child behind them.

Us newbies sell quite a few blats each day because some kook somewhere weaves a pattern of lead on the nude body of his beloved, only to tell the fuzz later, "I did it because I loved her."

As long as we have laws against homicide or manslaughter, it is morally a mite difficult to justify the wholesale pushing of lethal weapons.

"Safe handling" is just a fragrant way of saying, "Teaching how to shoot to kill."

Most people can be trusted with guns. Most people can likewise be trusted not to murder their mother.

But penal laws aren't passed by society to protect most people from themselves but to protect most people from the unstable and criminal few.

Spreading the gospel of guns will up the incidence of murder as surely as fallout follows bomb testing, no matter what the lobbyists say.

The more nuts learn how to use guns, the more people will get bumped off.

If increasing murder and other crimes of violence is what we want, then I'm all for the gun-pushers, and commend highly anything which does for shooting what the Little Leagues have done for baseball.
