Moon Trip Offered To Kiddies

Local children will be treated to free trips to the moon next weekend when Frankie Luer brings his huge space ship to the Foods Co. Markets at 2655 Pacific Coast Hwy. and at 17500 Crenshaw Blvd.

The authentic 60-foot replica of the giant interplanetary ship of the future will be at the Crenshaw market at 174th and Crenshaw from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Friday and at the Rolling Hills Plaza Market, Crenshaw and Pacific Coast Highway, on Saturday from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The space ship contains comfortable seating for 34 for the 7-minute trip to the moon through the medium of a full color animated film projected onto the front "view plate."

Visitors will be given the illusion of flight with both sound and vibration. Instruments record the altitude and flight time in a series of lights that can be seen by the passengers.

Captain Frank will welcome visitors aboard.

MRS. JESSUP pointed out that there were 4,788 patients discharged the fiscal year 1946-47, compared to the 6,710 January 1963 alone.

"Truly an indication of the population growth in the area," she said.

Mrs. Jessup began her county career as a seasonal clerk in the assessor's office July 1, 1929, and permanent in L. A. County's Hospitals Registrar's office, Sept. 1, 1929. city's largest taxpayer, Mobil Oil Co., businessmen, city officials, and current members of the Board of Education. Each of the candidates has endorsed the proposal with the exception of Piatt.

BEEFING UP school requirements and strengthening of remedial reading and vocational training courses have characterized much of the campaigning.

Side issues introduced at some of the public forums attended by each of the candidates have included questions on the renewal of the contract held by Superintendent J. H. Hull, stands on federal aid to education, and textbook selection.

ON RENEWING Dr. Hull's contract, most of the candidates indicated they would continue to employ him if he followed the board's decisions on policy, some hedged, saying it was not a proper issue for public debate and was more properly one to be discussed at a personnel meeting, while only one candidate, Piatt, indicated he would not vote to renew his contract. Piatt made his stand on the Hull issue when speaking at a public meeting sponsored by the Torrance Educational Assn. last Monday.

Most candidates again opposed federal aid to education in areas other than the present public laws which bring federal funds to areas impacted by federal activities. Dr. McClure, however, identified himself as an advocate of federal aid.

All have expressed a desire to help strengthen school programs and to get the most for the tax dollar from our educational system.
