

Symphony Sets May Concert

Beach Cities Symphony will present its fourth and final concert of the 1962-63 season May 24 in Mira Costa Auditorium in Manhattan Beach. Louis Palange, conductor of the symphony, has chosen for this final concert a program of operatic arias, duets, trios and overtures.

Performing will be three professional vocalists: Maria Martino, soprano; Giovanni Zavatti, tenor; and Rudolfo Castillo, baritone. This will mark the first appearance with the symphony of Miss Martino and Castillo but audiences will remember Zavatti's performance as Lt. Pinkerton in last year's production of "Madam Butterfly."

THE PROGRAM will be as follows: "Rosamunde Overture," Franz Schubert; "The Maids of Cadiz," Leo Delibes; "Vesta La Guibba" from Pagliacci, Ruggero Leoncavallo; "Blue Danube Waltz," Strauss; "Concertino," Cecile Chaminade; "Evening Star" from Tannhauser, Wagner; "Cavalleria Duet Santuzza and Turridu," Mascagni; "Trio from Il Trovatore," Verdi; and the "Tannhauser Overture," Wagner.

This concert is under the joint sponsorship of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, the Los Angeles County Music Commission, and the Recording Industries Trust Fund of the American Federation of Musicians, Local 47.

There will be no admission charge.

Artist Co-op Sets Special Gallery Show

The works of six newly-elected members of the Artists Co-op Gallery, 216 Manhattan Beach Blvd., Manhattan Beach, will be featured in a month-long special show starting tomorrow night, with a preview showing from 7:30 to 10:30 p.m. Regular gallery hours are 10:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily, including Sunday.

Members whose works will be featured include Jurgis Sapkus, John Gardner, Glenn Cavalli, Anne Lebkicher, Donald Spencer and Julia Kiefer.

The special show is the first in a series of alternating one- or two-man special subject shows to be held at the gallery monthly, according to Zan Wasser, group president. Coincident with the new-member show, a complete change of works by all member artists will be made.

The Artists Co-op is composed of 30 professional painters, printmakers, sculptors, and draughtsmen, organized in a non-profit group to operate a public gallery.

Booster of World Trade Speaks Here

Peter Weber, vice president of the International Trade Club and assistant manager of the Wilmington branch, United California Bank, spoke to members of the South Torrance Lions Club yesterday on the importance of keeping Americans "sold" on the value of world trade to the American economy.

A native of London, a former Swiss banker, and a graduate of the Neuchatel, Switzerland, college, Weber reported that the concern over balance of payments and the wide publicity of the Trade Expansion Act have focused attention on U. S. foreign commerce. Americans still need reassurance that world trade is in their best interest, he said.
