

Church Plans Camp Outing This Summer

The Lomita Christian Church has finalized its camp schedule for the summer program at Canyon Christian Camp, Castain, Calif.

The high school camp, available to ninth through 12th-grade students, will be held July 1 to 6. Vesper inspirational speaker will be Harold Gallagher of Hawaii.

The junior camp will be held July 15 to 20 for grades five through eight.

The family camp will be held from August 31 to September 2.

Tuition for the high school and junior camp will be \$19 per week and family camp charges will be \$7.50, for each adult, and \$5, for each child, with a maximum of \$30 for three days.

213th Street Work Started

Work has begun on the \$11,600 improvement portion of 213th Street from Main to westerly of Dolores Street.

The project will include engineering of the roadway to grade construction of a concrete cross-flow gutter and curb returns at Shearer Avenue.

Recent subdivision activity in the area has resulted in drainage problems and deterioration of road surfaces, Supervisor Burton W. Chace said.

"The proposed development of a county park near Bolsa Street also will bring more traffic into this area. The overall improvement will correct street deficiencies and reduce maintenance costs," Chace said.

Caution Light In Operation

New crossing warning signals were put into operation this week on Crenshaw Boulevard in front of the El Camino College administration building.

The crosswalk is situated 671 feet south of Manhattan Beach Boulevard on Crenshaw. The signals provide protected crossing for students and college visitors.

"The signals are equipped with push-buttons for persons wishing to cross the street," Supervisor Kenneth Hahn explained.

When the button is pushed, flashing yellow 'caution' lights will go into operation to warn approaching vehicles to let pedestrians cross.

Although the crosswalk has been provided for some time, Hahn noted that motorists unfamiliar with this section of Crenshaw had frequently continued at normal speed past the crosswalk even as students started across the street.

"The new pedestrian signals will provide ample warning to both students and approaching vehicles," emphasized Hahn.

The need for the signals was brought to Hahn's attention by Student Body President Jerry Goddard of Redondo Beach and Dr. Stuart Marsee, president at El Camino.

Folksongs of many nations will comprise the annual Marymount College spring concert, May 12, on the Palos Verdes Estates campus. Roger Wagner will conduct.

Participating will be the Marymount college choir and the Coro Clasico de Palos Verdes with traditional songs and with selections by Monteverdi, Griffith, Schubert, Morley, Handel, Copeland and Vaughan Williams.

The combined choirs will present "Let Thy Holy Presence," by Tschesnokoff, "Tutu Maramba," arranged by James Erb, "When Love Is Kind," English folksong, and "Simple Gifts," a Shaker folksong arranged by Aaron Copland.

Marymount singers will offer "Skip to My Lou," arranged by Allen Griffith and "There's a Hole in My Bucket," English folksong.

THE CORO CLASICO de Palos Verdes, consisting of choral students from the college extension division, will sing "As From the Earth a Flower Grows," by Monteverdi, "Dass Sie Hier Gewesen,"

Schubert, "O Sleep, Fone Fancy," Morley and "Where'er You Walk," Handel.

Following the intermission, both choirs and soloists will join in the Ralph Vaughan Williams arrangement of "Folk Songs for the Four Seasons," comprising 13 short songs based on the season of the year.

The concert will begin at 3 p.m. in the student-faculty center, with an admission charge of \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students.
